

LONDON DARK TO SAVE CITY

Electric Lights Darkened at Night as Precaution Against Possible Zeppelin Raid

LONDON, Oct. 19.—Not since the electric light supplanted gas has London been so somber at night as at present, when the German Zeppelin is not an unlikely visitor. The illuminated signs of Piccadilly Circus, the lamp-studded cafés-fronts of Leicester Square, have been extinguished. No more light is allowed than is necessary to traffic. Along the main ways of London, Threadneedle and Fleet streets, the Strand, Regent and Oxford streets, comprising the principal financial and shopping districts, only every third street lamp is in use, and the upper halves of these are masked with black paint so as to throw down a cone of light on the roadway. It is on these, line that the Bank of England, St. Paul's Cathedral, Trafalgar Monument, the National Gallery and the British Museum lie. The suburbs, where the restrictions are easier, are now the brightest parts of London.

The war has put a damper on London's gaiety in other respects. The "pub," or saloons, must shut doors at 11 at night, instead of 12:30 as formerly. The liquor regulation has also practically ended the theatre supper business of the hotels. The restaurant habits have declined in general. There are still twenty-two theatres running, whose business depends not on the state of the weather but on how the war goes. Good news means good business, while a bad reverse to the Allies leaves stalls and galleries empty.

The people are not nervous and trust to the searchlights which play over London at night to save them from the Zeppelins.

OREGON DAY AT FAIR MAY ATTRACT BAN

Manager Fred Wilson Will Look Into Matter of Visit on Oregon Day, June 15.

Though the opening of the Panama Pacific Exposition is still months away the bandmen are already considering the plan to take them there for several concerts during the fair. On the strength of the great success made by the band on their visit to the state fair and the advertisement resulting for Coos Bay, the plan of sending the musical citizens to San Francisco has gained much enthusiasm. With Oregon Day coming on June 15 and the following day Portland Rose Day, it is argued that the major attraction on the ground for those two days at least, would be Oregon and the Oregon building. To have the Coos Bay band on the spot, believe the bandmen, would bring a proper share of this notice to Coos Bay and the Coos and Curry county exhibits.

FISHING IN UMPQUA.

Over 15,000 Salmon Taken in One Night.

It is reported that the fishing is good around Scottsburg at the present time, from 200 to 250 per boat being caught. People from Coos Bay come into Scottsburg this time of year and buy fish to put down for winter use, coming from Cottage Grove, Yoncalla, Oakland, Drain and Elkton.

Sunday night was the banner night for fishing so far during the season, over 15,000 being caught and brought to the two canneries Monday morning. Of this number about 10,000 were taken to the Umpqua Packing Company at Reedsport, and 5000 to the Co-operative Company, near Gardiner. They are nearly all Silverides, for which the fishermen get 15 cents apiece.—Gardiner Courier.

FREEDOMERS BEAT ELECTION

Road Districts Vote Special Taxes on November 2. Previous to General Election

Because there is an amendment before the people to be voted on November 2nd which, if passed, will allow all voters, and not necessarily the freeholders, to vote on public improvements, road districts of the county will hold meetings of the freeholders on November 2, the day ahead of the main election, to vote on special road taxes.

At a meeting of the county commissioners W. T. Dement and G. J. Armstrong yesterday with Judge Hall at Coquille, the plans for special road taxes in eight different road districts of the county were considered and favorably passed on. In every case these special taxes will cover work which is now under way and in which more funds are necessary for the completion of the projects.

In district No. 3 at North Bend a meeting will be held in regard to the road now building to Empire and in district eight a special tax is necessary to open the road from North Inlet to Ten Mile and to complete a ditch between North and Ten Mile lakes.

Meetings will also be held at Coquille Bridge, district 17, for building of the big way toward Dora on the Coquille River, which is in district 18, and at Bandon, where the citizens are now completing a highway between Bandon and Coos County line. At Lee, Lawhorn, and on Cherry Creek, where a road, a tributary to the Coos Bay Wagon Road, is being built, a special meeting is to be held and also at Lee on the North Coquille River and on Bear Creek in road district number 20.

MANY SEEK NEW AUTO AGENCY

More Than 6,600 Motor Car Men Are After Connection With Big Manufacturer

It will be incorporated under the name of the First National Bank of the Umpqua at Gardiner, with a capital stock of \$25,000, 250 shares at a par value of \$100 each. Fifteen per cent premium will be added for the purpose of organization and expenses for the first year. O. B. Hunsdale, superintendent of the Gardiner Mill Co., is the prime mover in the enterprise. The site for the new bank building has not as yet been decided upon or whether it will be built of brick, concrete or lumber, but that the building when completed will be a credit to the town there is no doubt.—Gardiner Courier.

TOBACCO IS VERY SCARCE GUN CONTAINS BLANK SHELLS

English Soldiers Appeal For It —Booze Tabooed in Armies —Czar Forbids Its Use

LONDON, Oct. 19.—Messages from the front saying that tobacco is like gold dust to the soldier has so touched the sympathy of smokers that mail to the continent is now filled with cigarettes, pipes and plug cut. Societies are formed for the collection of tobacco in its various forms and boxes for such contributions are now prominent on hotel desks and club tables and other places frequented by smokers.

While all classes are helping Tommy Atkins to get his smoke, temperance societies are fervently urging him not to drink. These societies want the men to volunteer to do what was made compulsory in the Russian army by the Czar's anti-alcohol law. The bishop himself is not joining the expeditionary force.

KINNEY CASE AGAIN.

Testimony Taken Over Allowing of \$56,000 to Fred Hollister and H. J. Isaacs.

During the last few days, in the office of Peck & Peck, testimony was taken in regard to the allowing of \$56,000 of unsecured debts from the Kinney estate to Fred Hollister and H. J. Isaacs, who claim a priority over the other general creditors on the grounds that it was their diligence which brought the Kinney case up for trial. Also W. J. Rusi, for many months manager of the estate, was questioned on the propriety of some disbursements made while he was trustee. This testimony will be at once submitted to Judge Harris, at Eugene, for his final decision. There is about \$100,000 still owing the other small general creditors of the Kinney estate and these creditors seek to have the \$56,000 divided among themselves in addition to the Waite and Kollock mortgage claims. All debts total about \$450,000.

RAILWAY CAMPS BUD

Investigation of Places Along Bay-Eugene Line.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 20.—Salem Labor Commissioner O. P. Hall announced with the state health officer and the health officers of the counties of Coos and Lane that they investigate the conditions of the construction camps along the line of the Willamette-Fall River way which is being built near Eugene and Coos Bay. He received a complaint from Coos County that the camps were filthy.
