**Cuts Out Eureka.**—The Geo. W. Elder will cut out her trip to Eureka this week and on her arrival here tomorrow will turn back direct to Portland in order to get back on her schedule. She was delayed by the rough bar at Eureka last week.

**Speaks Here.**—Dr. Bertha Stuart of the University of Oregon will speak before a meeting of the Mothers and Teachers' Club of Oregon here Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The meeting will be at the High School building and all interested in school work are invited.

**Initiate Two.**—D. I. Magee, the wholesale drug salesman, and Jack McDonald, of Blue Ridge Tiger fame, are to be initiated by the Marshfield lodge of Elks this evening and a large number of their friends are planning to be out and see that the Antlers are properly set.

**Move Voting Place.**—On petition of the citizens of Eastport, presented to the county court, that body has consented on the removal of the polling place from Libby to Eastport where the election will be held in the new school house. Libby was so far away, stated the petition, that very few people could take the time and trouble to go there and vote.

**Here for Meeting.**—C. F. Flinn, local manager at Bandon of the Robert Dollar mill, arrived in the city yesterday and will attend the meeting this evening of the members of the Sigma Chi fraternity who are to organize an alumni chapter in the office of Dr. Mott, of North Bend. Mr. Flinn was a member of the fraternity at Purdue University.

**Inspect City Jail.**—Perhaps John Jackson and Charles Benson had heard Attorney Graves speak slightly of the city jail and therefore wanted to inspect it to verify his words. At any rate the two men secured a night's lodging there and this morning appeared before Police Judge Butler and pleaded guilty to taking a "nip too much." The judge's face actually brightened as the men appeared. It had been two whole days since he had had any visitors on this charge. The men

were given the "high sign" to "beat it." They called their inspection off and took the high road out of town.

**Settle on Chicken Ranch.**—Mrs. E. O. Hall and son Frank went to Coquille this morning from their home at Sumner. They have purchased a chicken ranch there at the edge of town and expect to make their home there permanently. Mr. E. O. Hall, formerly lived in Marshfield and later moved to Sumner where he had a general store. He died last July.

**Eighteen Ounce Apple.**—A huge Gravenstein apple weighing 18 ounces was sent to Secretary Motley of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday from the ranch of R. W. Lundy who has an orchard on the Coquille river near Myrtle Point. The apple is without a blemish and almost perfect in its shape, showing clearly what can be done with apples in Coos County.

**Dredge Begins Operations.**—The bucket dredge Oregon was moved up opposite the hunter's cabin at the head of North Inlet last evening and this morning will begin dredging operations. The dredge will work about two miles up the canal and will probably be finished within the next three weeks. From there the Oregon will be moved over onto Haynes Inlet for dredging.

**Have Not Returned.**—John Van Burger and Al Sprague of Ten Mile, the fathers of Ray Van Burger and Albion Sprague, who were rescued by the Tillamook after being out five days in a disabled gasoline launch, were in Marshfield today. The boys are still harbored at Yaquina on the Tillamook and they have not sent any additional particulars to what has been printed.

**Looks for Stolen Propeller.**—I. Tower went on a tour of investigation this morning, searching for a brass propeller that was stolen from his boat about three weeks ago. Investigation at the Nelson Iron Works brought no trace of the missing article and Mr. Tower is hoping that further unearthing of the thefts of boys implicated will expose his lost propeller.

**Receive Contracts.**—Contracts for the heating, plumbing and the wiring of the new Star Theatre, on the corner of Third street and Central avenue have been awarded, according to Architect Turpin. The Pioneer Hardware Company will install the heating apparatus. Pennock Bros. will have the plumbing and the wiring will be installed by C. A. Langworthy. No definite time is set for the finishing of this work though it will be commenced immediately.

**Big Engine in Shape.**—Working for more than a week Harold Stutsman and Gordon Smith, engineers of the fire department, have completely overhauled the big stationary fire-engine which will be tried out tomorrow. Practically all the valves have been reground and the engine is now kept on hand for emergency purposes. Today a side approach to the fire station was begun. This will allow the taking of the smaller engines out the side door and will not interfere with the auto truck in the front of the building.
