**Connect Docks.**—The Reynolds Development Company has let a contract to John Johnson to build a new piece of wharf connecting with the Ocean dock and the Standard Oil dock. It will improve the appearance of the waterfront and will be a decided convenience in handling freight.

**Rolls Barely in Time.**—An unknown man barely escaped death early this morning when he either failed to hear or to heed the bell and whistle warning of the North Bend motor car until the car was but a few feet from him. Jumping in a hurry the man tripped and fell and Conductor Kardell rang for the emergency brakes.

**Married Last Night.**—James S. Boyd, a nurse, was married to Miss Alma J. Johnson, also a nurse, last evening, in the office of Justice of the Peace Penneck. ## HITS STRANGER WITH REVOLVER

**Without a Word Harry Carymer Assaults John Doyle, Inflicting Deep Scalp Wound**

"They're after me and I got one of them," was the explanation given by Carymer for his assault upon John Doyle last night. The man had been drinking heavily and is laboring under the impression that devils are pursuing him. He waived examination before Justice Penneck in the Justice Court and was bound over to the grand jury under \$500 bonds. He was taken this afternoon to the county jail in Coquille by Constable Cox.

With a six shooter in his hand Harry Carymer walked up to John Doyle, an utter stranger, in the Nutwood saloon last night and cracked him across the forehead with the barrel of the gun. Without a word Carymer then turned on his heel and walked out of the saloon. A moment he was arrested by Chief of Police Carter who was immediately on the scene and a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon was placed against Carymer. Doyle reeled from the blow and stunned, would have fallen to the floor had he not been leaning against the bar. Several stitches were taken in his scalp by Dr. Horstfall.

Who Carymer may be and why he hit him is still a mystery to Doyle who declares he never has spoken to the man and only has seen him once or twice on the streets. As far as known Carymer came here a month ago and for about three weeks has been living in a shack below the city dock at the foot of Alder Avenue. Doyle, who for two years has been in the employ of the Smith Powers company in camp 7 at Coaledo, has been here getting his foot healed up from a wound accidentally inflicted by an axe while at work. He was standing along side the bar at the time of the assault chatting with a friend and failed to notice the silent approach of Carymer from behind and knew nothing of his presence until hit.

Carymer declared Doyle had abused him a few minutes before, outside the saloon. To this Doyle made emphatic denial stating he knew nothing of the man and had never spoken to him.

So quickly was the deed done that no one had time to catch Carymer before he had gained the street. Charles Connor, followed him, hailed Chief Carter across the street who immediately set out after the man who in turn threw his gun between some buildings. Running the Chief brought him down in front of the Wasson Bowling Alleys. The gun is a Smith & Weston Special 38 calibre and contained six shells, the one in the barrel being empty.
