The school board have given their permission to the high school football team for the arranging of a Thanksgiving game out of the county. Letters have been written to Astoria with the hope that a game might be scheduled for there on "Turkey day." No word has yet been received from the north. This is the first time a Marshfield team has been granted permission by the school board to leave on a trip outside the county.

Following the welcome given to the Coos Bay Band in Portland by the Chamber of Commerce a letter was written from the local organization thanking the members there. A letter, received this morning by Secretary John Motley, from C. C. Chapman, manager of the executive committee of the Club, declared it had been a pleasure and that they would ask the band to come again.

Have Big Exhibit.

A large picture of the Sperry Flour Company's exhibit at the Panama Pacific Exposition has been received at the Chamber of Commerce. This building is the largest private exhibit at the fair, is a building three stories in height and covers 6699 square feet of ground space. Inside the building is a small flour mill and through the glass sides visitors will be able to see the wheat through all the processes until it comes out in hot loaves "like mother used to make."

OPEN BIDS TONIGHT.

High School Gymnasium Will Be Commenced Within a Few Days—Several Bids In.

At the meeting of the school board to be held this evening, bids for the sale of the \$19,000 Marshfield high school bonds will be opened. That they will be sold seems to be a foregone conclusion, for into the office of Judge John F. Hall this week have been coming letters from bonding firms, several banks and in some cases from contractors, and the supposition is that they all contain bids on part or all of the bonds. Work will be commenced within two or three days after the money is on hand, declares Judge Hall, and it is possible that the building may be finished in time for some of the high school basket ball games, coming after the first of the new year.

With some of the contractors making bids for the bonds it is thought they will take them up and later turn them over to bonding companies.
