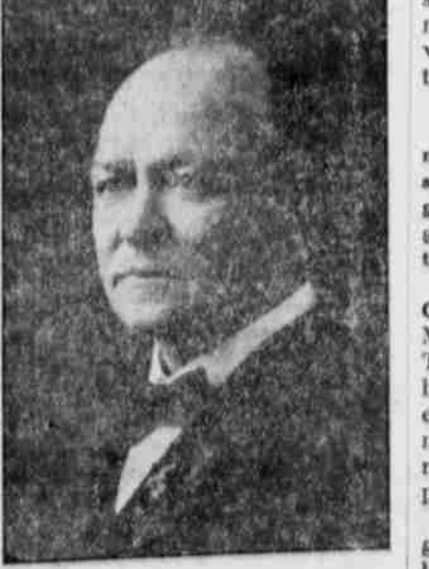

PROPELLER TO HASTEN BOATS  
Brother of Joaquin Miller Thinks He Has Invented a Great Device

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 24.—Constructing a propeller that he claims will revolutionize river and ocean navigation throughout the world, James Henry Blair Miller, a brother of the late Joaquin Miller, is living in a small house on the bank of the Willamette river at the foot of Montgomery street, where he is doing the work. At the age of 74 years, he feels, he says, that the ambition of a life time is about to be realized. Sixty years ago when he first saw a river boat with stern propeller, Mr. Miller says he made up his mind to build a propeller that would not strike the water with such resistance. The propeller has eight blades, each six feet long and 12 inches wide and each working on ratchets, so that the edge of the blade strikes the water as it enters, falls into propelling position while in deepest water and continues to adjust itself as the wheel turns, so that it emerges from the water edge first. The flat side of the blade never strikes the water. As the wheel turns, the blades enter and leave the water edge first, with as little resistance as a feathered oar.

Mr. Miller is an Oregon pioneer of 1852, having located at Oregon City 62 years ago.

NOT ALLOWED TO WEIGH EXTRAS  
New Regulations Prohibit Dealers From Charging For Paper and String on Bundles

D. L. Rood, Coos County Sealer of Weights and Measures, will probably get busy soon enforcing a new rule that has just been issued by state officials to the effect that customers cannot be charged for the weight of paper and string around a commodity. This is particularly true of bacon and ham when bought in the full size pieces. However, the rule applies to all commodities.

"Hams and bacon are selling at from 20 to 40 cents per pound," said one official, "and as there is a pound of paper and string on every ham and each side of bacon, you can see that the purchasing public is up against the local merchants are probably not to blame for the practice, as I understand they are compelled to pay for the weight of the meat with the wrappings. But if they are compelled to change their practice, as they surely will be, they may also demand the same kind of treatment from the packing houses."

The instructions sent out by the state department on this subject say: "If a purchaser buys a ham, he is entitled to the net weight of the ham and should not be made to pay for a canvas cover and several ounces of wrapping paper. He also is entitled to buy the ham at its true weight at the time of sale and not what it did weigh one, two or three months before; and this applies to the sale of all commodities that are subject to a loss or gain in weight while in storage or being held for the purpose of sale."

LUMBER SHIP VERY UNIQUE  
E. H. Dodge Plans Vessel Carrying 5,000,000 Which Can Be Loaded in One Hour

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 23.—Plans of the new drydock lumber steamship designed by F. A. Ballin, a naval architect, and E. H. Dodge, for which they have obtained a government patent, are for a vessel with capacity for handling 5,000,000 feet of lumber at a trip. She is to be 640 feet long with 80 foot beam and a hold depth of 41 feet.

When put in shape for loading the vessel will be submerged. Ten barges loaded with lumber, each carrying 500,000 feet, will be floated through bow gates into compartments of the craft. It is estimated that the vessel can be loaded in an hour. The claim also is made that she will be able to complete the round trip between Portland and San Francisco in seven days, including loading and discharging. On the return trip she can carry fuel oil, asphalt, cement, or most any other class of freight. The idea is to have about three sets of barges, ten at each end of the line and ten en route. In carrying out that plan it is explained the extra barges can be loaded while the vessel is in transit. The barges may be distributed among the various sawmills and loaded as the lumber is cut for them.

STATE HAS NO JURISDICTION OVER INDIAN MATTERS

So Decides Department of Interior in Jesse May Wiley Case.  
That the Department of the Interior has all jurisdiction over matters relating to Indian matters and hence the legality of the adoption of Jesse May Wiley and the resultant suit for half interest in the estate of her adopted Indian mother can not be fought out in the state courts. This is the decision received today by Attorneys Hoy and Miller from E. B. Merritt, assistant Indian commissioner.

With this decision is again brought into the limelight a bit of human interest history, intricate and interesting. Years ago, a white man, Harry Hanson, married an Indian woman and the couple had one child, who is now Mrs. Maggie Sacchi. Mrs. Hanson adopted Jesse May Wiley, daughter of Charles Wiley, who had also married an Indian woman. Several years later Mrs. Hanson died and her foster daughter was sent to an Indian school. The girl, on her return, asked a half share in the Indian allotment which had belonged to her foster mother, Mrs. Hanson, and which was all then being held by the daughter, Mrs. Sacchi. This half share amounted to about \$2000, property situated on the Bandon road, south of the Coos Bay entrance.

To the Department of the Interior was submitted the question as to the legality of the claim made by Jesse May Wiley, the adopted daughter. The decision was in her favor and the defendants in turn asked that they be allowed to decide this question in the state courts. The new decision just reached is that the state has no jurisdiction in such matters and hence the first decision of the Department will stand and Jesse May Wiley, now aged eighteen years, will receive a half share of the allotment.
