KEEP STRICT WATCH ON LAWS

Industrial Welfare Commission Will Send Representative Here to Investigate

A list of all factories, hotels, restaurants, laundries and telephone companies that employ women, girls and minor boys has been sent to the secretary of the Industrial Welfare Commission of the state, which has its headquarters in Portland. The list was furnished by the Chamber of Commerce and will be used as a means of assuring the Commission that no infractions on the present laws are being committed.

For a complete investigation of the local working conditions an investigator will be sent here and he will personally inspect every factory on the list. Strict are the laws in regard to the employment of women and girls only eight hours during the day. Also the law will force a strict observance of the clause in regard to working conditions, paying special attention to sanitary and safety appliances.

From Coos Bay the list contained approximately 45 concerns that employ women, girls and minor boys, though there were only three of the latter.

THOUGHT HE WAS PURSUED

Harry Carymer Carried Big Revolver to Kill Pursuers—Had "Snakes."

Constable Cox heaved a sigh of relief yesterday when he placed Harry Carymer behind the bars of the Coquille jail where he will remain until the meeting of the grand jury in December. John Doyle, Thursday night with a revolver. Carymer had never seen the man before until he stepped up from behind and struck him.

Questioned on the way over to the county seat Carymer told the constable he is 26 years of age and arrived here 30 days ago from Oklahoma. Since then he has been drunk and deluded the man into believing he was being hounded. It was for this reason that he carried the heavy 35 calibre revolver. There was one blank in the gun when the man was captured, the other five chambers being loaded.

With a crazy man loose, carrying a gun and on the lookout for suspected enemies the police wonder how many the man would have killed had he not been captured. From his cell Carymer constantly pointed out imaginary foes lurking in dark corners, declaring they all were after him and he'd better get them first, and along the road he drew back from the car windows, wishing "to get out of town without the bunch seeing where he went."

John Doyle, the man who was assaulted by Carymer is recovering and expects to return to his work within a few days.

NEW DODGE CAR IS POPULAR

More Than Ten Thousand Dealers Seek Agency of New Automobile

Recently The Times printed a statement made by a traveling salesman that 6500 dealers had applied for the agency of the new Dodge automobile. These figures proved to be nearly four thousand short of the actual number. A late issue of the San Francisco Examiner contains the following:

"Along about the first of August General Sales Manager Philip made the prediction that 10,000 dealers would have made application for Dodge Brothers' sales rights by October 1," said George C. Hubbs of Dodge Brothers.

"Just how close he came to hitting the mark is shown by the total count for the first day of October. On that day 10,201 separate dealers from the United States and Canada had written to the factory about the new car. Requests are still coming in at an average of 100 a day, with no sign of let up."

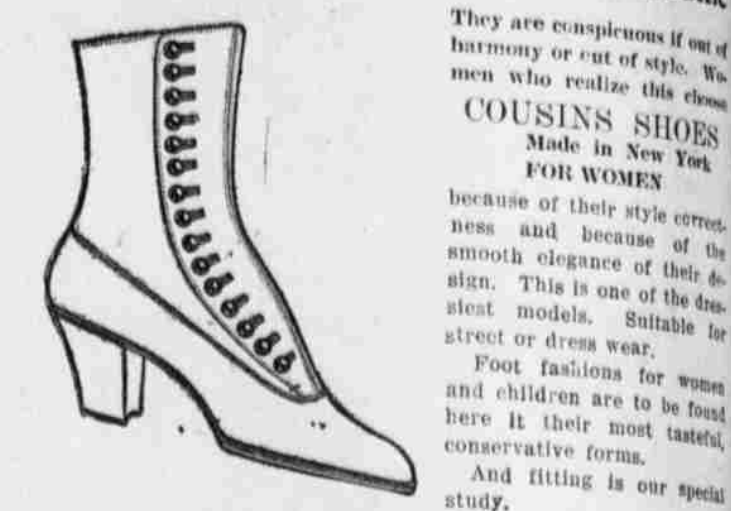
