**PORTLAND WINS COAST PENNANT**

**Captures 1914 Coast League Baseball Championship—Fifth Time.**

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 26.—With the winning of the 1914 Pacific coast pennant, the season closing yesterday, Walter McCredie established a new league record. Los Angeles, with Pop Dillon guiding the machine most of the time, had previously been tied with Portland at four gonfalons apiece, but Mack's newest pennant-winning puts him one rag to the good. Five championships since 1905 is

Walter McCredie's boast, and it is one that ought to go down in Pacific history. In some respects the 1914 pennant-winning combination resembled that of the year previous. Both got away like hobby horses and were down near the cellar about two months after everybody had abandoned hope. This year Mack left training camp with one veteran catcher, three veteran pitchers and a bunch of rookies, none of whom was worth a nickel to him. As a consequence the Beavers were in fifth place as late as June 1. They did not climb into the first division until the fore part of July. About that time McCredie spent his money with prodigality, for he saw he had to inject new material into his fighting strength to win. He bought Pitcher Rieger from St. Paul, Evans and Lush from the Cleveland Naps, Martinoni and Eastley from the

Colts and Catchers Yantz, from the Naps and Brenegan from Pittsburg. Likewise Pitcher Pape was induced to report and his presence cost the McCredies about \$1500, although he wasn't of any use. Bancroft Gets Credit. However, even with McCredie spending his money like a drunken longshoreman, it is doubtful if the Beavers would have been able to come through had not Dave Bancroft forged to the front like a meteor. Shortstop Davis got off to a bad start, due to a game leg, and that gave Bancroft his opportunity. The ex-Colt grabbed it with all hands and did sensational work the remainder of the year. There was no dislodging him once he was there, for he was the tapoca at short. Now the majors are after him, and it is certain he will not be back next year. Bill Rodgers and Gus Fisher and big Irv Higginbotham also are entitled to a great deal of credit. Portland's pennants have all been won by McCredie. The championship years: 1906, 1910, 1911, 1913 and 1914.

**SPEEDWELL LEAVES SATURDAY WITH PASSENGERS AND TIES**

**Sails for San Francisco with Large Cargo of Railroad Ties—24 Passengers.**

**Along the Waterfront.**

The Paraiso came in this morning from Portland, bringing a passenger list of eighteen persons in the cabin and five steerage. Among the 110 tons of freight from the north were 25 tons of steel girders for the big railroad bridge at North Bend. This is the second shipment received. The Paraiso leaves Thursday for San Francisco, moving down to North Bend this afternoon to unload freight for there.

The gasoline schooner Roamer arrived in this morning from the Sitka law, bringing canned salmon to the Arrow Line dock for shipment north.

The tugboat Roscoe is in today from the Sitka law on what may be her last trip this season. On the return to the north, the Roscoe is expected to be overhauled.

Yesterday afternoon the tugboat Glenner came in from the Umpqua and this afternoon left out, carrying freight for Gardiner.

In the morning the gasoline schooner Rustler is expected to leave for Gold Beach and Wedderburn with a miscellaneous cargo of freight.

Coming for cans to be used in the co-operative cannery at Gardiner, the Patsy came in yesterday from the Umpqua and left out for there this afternoon. For ten days the Patsy was harbored at Astoria on her last trip, unable to get out, while the canneries of the Umpqua were unable to get cans.

The Navajo arrived in late this afternoon from San Francisco and if there is good moonlight this evening she is expected to leave out for Portland. The Navajo is one of the largest ships of the Swayne & Hoyt fleet and generally plys between San Francisco and Portland, but this trip into Coos Bay is made to take the place of the Daisy Putnam, which was knocked here for eight days and abandoned off her schedule. The net tonnage of the Navajo is 2755 tons, that of the Nann Smith 2009 tons, though the latter is 19 feet longer than the former, having a length of 177 feet against 258 of the Navajo. The Nann Smith eclipses the other one foot in beam, having a width of 43 feet.

**ACCUSE THREE OF GARDINER ROBBERY**

**Men Arrested in Portland Suspected of Blowing Gardiner Mill Company's Safe**

To face charges of cracking the safe of the Gardiner Mill Company at Gardiner, Ore., arrested from which \$4500 was taken, were Eronson, John O'Neil and James. O'Neil will be taken to Roseburg by Sheriff Word.

The three were arrested on suspicion that they might have done or more safe cracking jobs in the Willamette Valley in the past few months.

Sheriff Word, Deputy Kasper and railway police arrested the three in Salem recently.

Word was received that two of the band were arrested at the city of Eureka, Ore. in the county of Butte and are in the custody of Sheriff Esch, of Salem. One is believed to be Charles Peterson, the "Big Swede," with a criminal record, and the name of the other still known. It is thought there still more members of the band are large.

Prosecuting Attorney George Brown and Sheriff Quinn are positive that the men arrested at Portland short time ago are the men wanted for the robbing of the Gardiner Co., safe at Gardiner some time ago. Their photos have been sent to the place and a number of persons have recognized them as men seen around the town a short time prior to the robbery. What convinces the officers more than anything else is that the men had money on their persons at the time of their arrest that corresponds to that taken from the safe as they have been unable to give satisfactory account of where they got it.
