HORSES DROWN COQUILLE RIVER

Ferry Slips From Shore as Team Steps Aboard—Fell Struggling Into Water

A team belonging to Steve Stewart a farmer residing near Riverton, was drowned yesterday morning in the Coquille River when the owner attempted to drive them aboard a ferry. The farm wagon, to which they were hitched, sank into the stream not far from the bank, drawing the team in and holding them struggling helpless in the water.

County Commission G. J. Armstrong has gone to investigate the matter and to determine on whom the blame for the accident should be fixed. As the ferry belongs to the county, if the ferryman was negligent in fastening his boat to the bank, there will be possible grounds for a damage suit against the county.

The story of the affair, as it has been heard here, is that the farmer dismounted from his wagon, prior to driving aboard the ferry. The team brought the wagon to the edge of the stream and stepped aboard the craft, which, being insecurely fastened, slipped away from the bank dropping the wagon into the river.

Held fast to the wagon with the heavy leather tugs the team had no chance to escape, but were hauled into the water where they drowned in a few minutes while the driver and ferryman were helpless to let them free.

TRIUMPHANT SEA ALMOST CLAIMS OLD MAN AT GOLD BEACH

Samuel Rothwell, a new arrival in our town, had an experience the other day which he will not forget soon. Mr. Rothwell is an old Indian War veteran, just seventy-four years of age and like all people coming from the interior, finds much interest along the beach.

On last Thursday the old gentleman took a stroll upon the beach, and for an advantageous view, safely above the raging surf, he climbed upon the roof of a log which had been mostly sawed off for wood. This roof happened to lay on a ridge of sand between the surf and a slough.

The old gentleman sat there and watched the surf for a long time, when, before he realized what was happening, a high roller came over him, log and all, and took him down through the slough towards the ocean at a terrific pace. Fortunately for the old man the force of the breaker passed over him before it had swept him into deep water, and he managed to gain his feet in water about waist deep and waded out before another breaker happened to come.

Had this accident happened on a straight beach in all probability the old gentleman would have been carried to sea and drowned.—Gold Beach Globe.

What Judge Hall Says About Liquor

Judge Points Out Cost of Liquor to County

(The following statement by Judge John F. Hall, Coos County Judge, is taken from the Coos Bay Times of May 8, 1914.) (Special to The Times.)

COQUILLE, Or., May 8.—Two more women were granted mothers' pensions yesterday. Judge Hall states that with the exception of yesterday's two pensions, ABOUT ONE-HALF OF THE PENSIONS WHICH THE COUNTY IS NOW PAYING ARE ATTRIBUTABLE TO OFFENSES RESULTING FROM THE USE OF LIQUOR.

He pointed out that the county will likely have to pay \$17.50 per month to the family of Jas. Ferrari, who was convicted yesterday of murdering John Kelly during a drunken brawl at Henryville, and also to the family of E. Maksudis, who hanged himself at Lampa and also to the family of another man who killed himself a few days ago on account of liquor.
