GOLD NUGGETS IN CHICKENS.

Sluslaw Poultry Raisers Find Valu-
ables in Crows.

The Sluslaw Pilot says: About six weeks ago H. F. Kendall, while dressing two chickens, found a small nugget of gold in each one. Considerable interest was caused by the find, although a number of people thought it was simply a joke. Mr. Kendall had bought four chickens of Fred Wilhelm, who lives two or three miles north of Florence. Soon after the story of the gold was circulated one of the chickens disappeared and they are now accusing Charley Morgan of taking it. Monday morning G. A. Anderson, the Jetty contractor, who is staying at Mr. Kendall's home, brought another small nugget to the Pilot office. This nugget had been taken from the last of the four chickens, which had been killed Sunday. This is three of the chickens killed out of four, and each one carrying gold in the gizzard.

The gold nuggets are about the size of a grain of wheat.

When Mr. Kendall went to kill the chicken he made a mistake and killed one of his wife's best layers, but he finally got the rooster.

There has been considerable speculation as to where the fowls got the gold, but it has been established that it is gold and that in three of the Wilhelm chickens nuggets have been found.
