### A Three Minute-Sermon

"There was war in Heaven; the dragon fought, and his angels." Revelation 12:7.

And so an environment is not sufficient to make one good or to make one happy. We hear a great deal in our days about environment being EVERYTHING. The man who wrote the book of Revelation had a different idea, and he expressed it very forcibly. He takes the finest environment that ever was conceived—Heaven. He pictures it in all its beauty, with its pearly streets and golden gates, with its rivers clear as crystal, and its fountains of living water, and its trees of luscious fruit, and its population of holy angels. Into this paradise he introduces a second company—a band of UNHOLY angels. One would think this new band had every chance, with such fine scenery and such godly companions. But it is all in vain. In a brief space they have made a Hell out of Heaven! They have found their surroundings quite intolerable! It is a striking picture. They have actually got INTO Heaven. They have seen the environment of the redeemed! They have gazed on the white robes! They have caught the spray of the fountains! They have basked in the light that has no setting! And yet, they are in misery, in unrest, in the land of peace they are at war!

And this your excuse for neglecting repentance, and thus you will live and thus die! But a word with you, my friend. Do you not take time to refresh the body with sleep and food, and shall you not attend to the wants of your immortal soul? Are we so sure that the soul may grow and thrive on nothing, or what really amounts to nothing, when the mortal part of us, our body, will not last more than a few days when we deny it nourishment and refuse to quench its thirst? The inward man grows like the outward man. It is fed by spiritual things, as the outward is fed by material things. Otherwise it starves. We lift up our hands in horror and utter expressions of deep pity when a starved body crosses our path, but souls that are emaciated and starving to death, don't worry us. Not otherwise than as flowers do souls grow. They need the same sunshine of love, the atmosphere of goodness, the nutriment of the graces and virtues of the Christian life to build them up.

And so we cannot take a half hour daily from our business for the devotional life that we may live in the realm of higher things. The busiest man, as Lord Brougham, has been able to accomplish great and numerous results by saving merely fragments of time, as goldsmiths save the filings of precious metals. And where is Sunday the day that was given expressly for devotion, and which properly improved would save the soul? How can you say you have no time, when fifty-two Sundays every year close your place of business and invite you to God's House of Prayer? But you mean that you devote Sundays also to the cares of business, the writing of letters, the examination of accounts, and thus truly, you have no time; but the reason is you kill it, and you deceive yourself with an excuse.

God gives abundant time for all our needs, temporal and spiritual; it remains for us to apportion that time properly. Your business cannot be half so engrossing as Daniel's, who with the superintendence of a kingdom, found time to return to his chamber and worship God three times a day. Conditions have changed, and we may not be able to keep Daniel's rule in the letter, but your own worship just the same in our own way.

## RENTS CHANDLER RANCH.

C. H. Chandler has rented his demonstration farm on the county road east of Bandon to J. Hazelton, who recently arrived in this section. The farm consists of seventeen acres, part of which is cleared and under cultivation and a considerable portion of the remainder is partly cleared.

Mr. Chandler has thirty-five different varieties of fruit and vegetables on this farm and they are all doing nicely and he also has a fine garden and orchard under cultivation on the Mrs. Ledgerwood place south of town. He says if anybody thinks that Coos county soil is not productive, he would like to have them visit either one of these farms and he will convince them that we can grow the finest of everything right here. Mr. Chandler receives \$100 a year for his seventeen-acre ranch, which is about \$5.90 an acre.—Bandon Recorder.

## JETTY WORK DONE

Johnson & Anderson Complete \$330,000 Job at Florence

FLORENCE, Or., Oct. 28.—Johnson-Anderson Company, who have been building the jetties at the mouth of the Siuslaw River for nearly three years past, have their contract about finished and have laid off part of their men.

The contract between the company and the Government was closed in February, 1912, the company being allowed 37 months to complete the work.

Since that time Johnson-Anderson have extended the south jetty 400 feet, have built a receiving wharf on the north side, and have constructed 7500 feet of jetty on that side of the river. The total amount received for this work is \$330,000.

## EUGENE VERY DRY

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 2.—To place themselves above any suspicion, the Eugene drug stores signed an agreement refusing to keep in stock intoxicating liquor. The action was taken following the circulating of an agreement among the physicians last night in which the physicians have given notice that they will write no whiskey prescriptions.

The action of the drug stores, and physicians makes Eugene absolutely "dry."

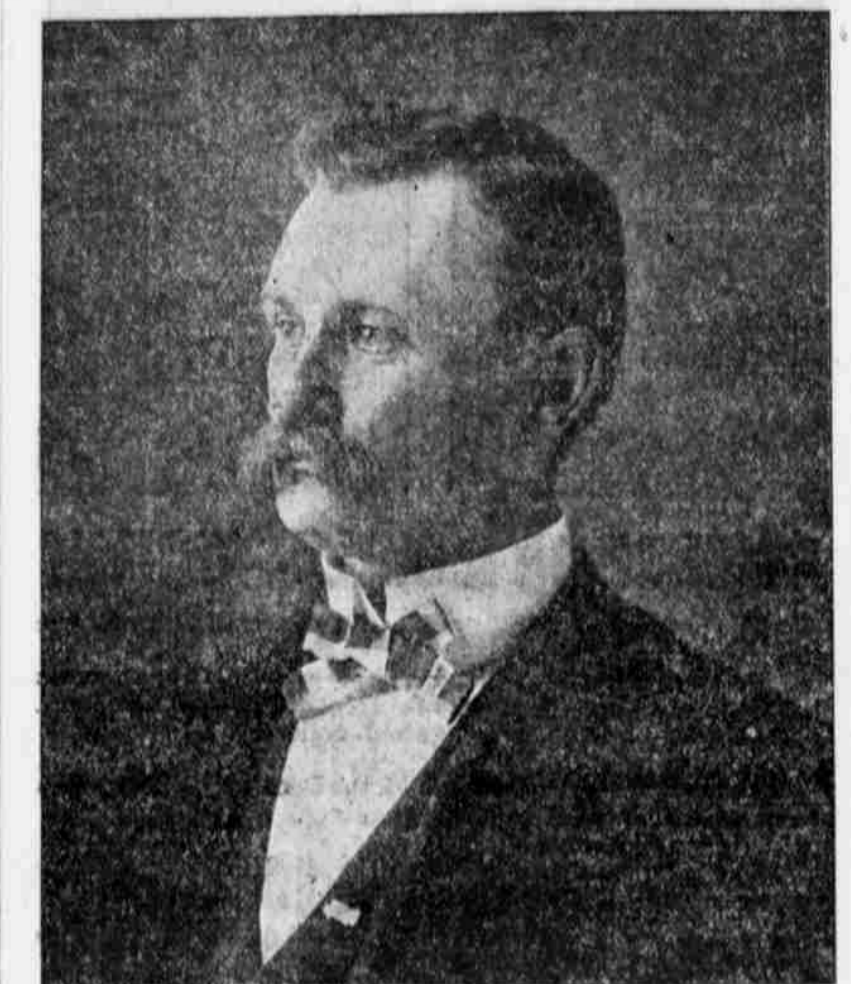

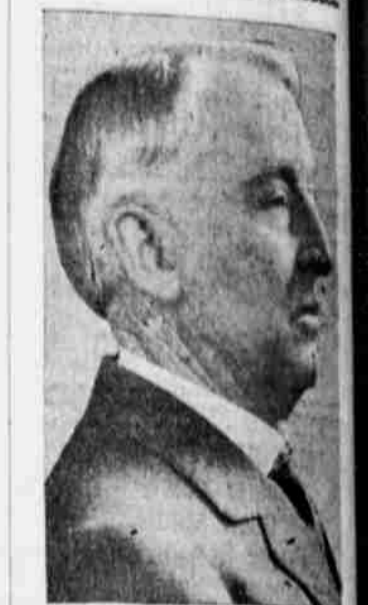
