Message Today States That She Will Sail From San Francisco In Short Time

That the Adeline Smith was not badly damaged in the reported collision with the Svea, a Grays Harbor lumber carrier, is indicated by a message to the local offices of the Smith company today saying that she would leave San Francisco in a couple of days for here.

Capt. Jacobson of the Navajo, which arrived here yesterday brought in the report, saying that he had overheard a wireless which said that the Svea had run into the Adeline in a fog.

"This is the first I have heard of an accident," said Capt. Magee of the Nann Smith, as he stepped ashore this morning and was greeted in regard to the wreck and condition of the Adeline.

The Adeline left San Francisco a short time before the Nann Smith. Officers of the latter boat think it strange that they received no further wireless from Capt. Olson of the Adeline when he turned and again headed south.
