**THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION SAYS THE UNITED STATES CAN FEED "ALL WHO NEED FOOD."**

NGTON, Oct. 31.—President Wilson has designated, November 26, as Thanksgiving Day. The President said:

It has long been the honored custom of our people to give thanks to the bountiful Autumn of the year in praise and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father for his many blessings and mercies. The year that is now drawing to a close has observed our day of National thanksgiving, has been a year of discipline because of the mighty war and of changes which have disturbed the peace of a year of special blessing for us.

We have been vouchsafed to us to remain at peace, with some part to succor the suffering and supply the needs of those who are in want. We have been privy to our own peace and self control in some degree to counsel and shape the hopes and purposes of a distressed Nation. Our people have looked upon their Nation with deeper comprehension, a fuller sense of their responsibilities as well as of their blessing sense of the moral and practical significance of their part among the Nations of the world.

The effects of foreign war in their own industrial and commercial affairs, have made them feel the more fully their mutual interdependence upon each other and has stirred them to a helpful co-operation which has seldom practiced before. They have been stimulated by a great moral stimulation. Their unmistakable sense of peace, their earnest pity and disinterested sympathy for those who are suffering, their readiness to help and their sense of the needs of others, has revealed them to themselves as well as to the world.

Our crops will feed all who need food; the self possession of our people amidst the most serious anxieties and difficulties and the steadiness and resourcefulness of our business will serve other Nations as well as our own.

The business of the country has been supplied with instrumentalities and the commerce of the world with new channels of trade and intercourse. The Panama Canal has been opened to the commerce of the Nations. The two continents of America have been bound in closer ties of friendly instrumentalities of international trade have been which will be also new instrumentalities of acquaintance and mutual service. Never before have the United States been so situated for their advantage or the advantage of their neighbors or so to serve themselves and mankind.

Therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, November 26, of November next, as a day of thanksgiving and invite the people throughout the land to cease their wonted occupations and in their several homes of worship render thanks to Almighty God."
