CONTRACTORS TO ASSIST UNION.
A contract agreement between the building contractors of the city and the local Number 1068 of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners will be presented to the union carpenters at their meeting tonight. According to this agreement the contractors concerned will agree to employ only union men, when they are available, at \$4 a day, this to go into effect next spring. The carpenters are now getting a daily wage of \$3.50. But with the signing of this agreement carpenters of the union will agree not to bid against building contractors on contract work and for such a breaking of this agreement the carpenters concerned must withdraw from the union for the period of one year. Failing to do this they will not be counted as union men by contractors engaging carpenters.

Eight hours will be the standard working day, according to this agreement, and men will be paid time and one half for all overtime and double time for Sundays and holidays.

The greater share of the carpenters appear in favor of the measure and declare that they are willing to accept the agreement which will considerably raise their wages.

The local union has a membership of about 45 carpenters. It was formed here last spring and has found its growth hindered by the open shop methods in vogue here at present and the carpenters are of the belief that this new measure, if carried, will aid them considerably in increasing their membership.

According to this agreement the contractors concerned will agree to employ only union men, when they are available, at \$4 a day, this to go into effect next spring. The carpenters are now getting a daily wage of \$3.50. But with the signing of this agreement carpenters of the union will agree not to bid against building contractors on contract work and for such a breaking of this agreement the carpenters concerned must withdraw from the union for the period of one year. Failing to do this they will not be counted as union men by contractors engaging carpenters.

Eight hours will be the standard working day, according to this agreement, and men will be paid time and one half for all overtime and double time for Sundays and holidays.
