PARIS, Nov. 3.—The official communication this afternoon says: "On our left wing the enemy seems to have completely abandoned the left bank of the Yser, down stream from Dixmude, and reconaissances by the troops of the allies undertaken on the highways in the inundated regions were successful in occupying points of passage across the river without great difficulty.
