RUSSIA REFUSES TO ACCEPT TURK APOLOGY AND WILL PUSH WAR

Apology of Porte for Assaults on Black Sea Ports and Fleet Not Accepted and Czar Will Now Settle Old Problem of Getting Opening to Mediterranean Sea.

EMPEROR WILLIAM AND LORD KITCHENER ARE REPORTED TO HAVE BEEN AT FRONT SUNDAY

Germans Alleged to Have Been Thwarted in Desperate Effort to Open Route to Dunkirk and Calais Along Coast and Are Seeking More Southerly Route Now.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The apology of the Turk for the assaults of his fleet on the Russian ports in the Black Sea has not accomplished its purpose. Both Russia and Great Britain have undertaken active military measure against him and hostilities have begun on the Red Sea.

In France, the troops of Emperor William, frustrated in persistent endeavors to advance along the coast, are now seeking a route more to the south, and fighting is going on with determination in Flanders.

Fighting is reported between the Russians and Turks near Trebizend. The Turkish ambassador left the Russian capital. The Russian foreign minister replied to the Porte that negotiations are now impossible and an imperial manifesto says that Russian confidence is firm that the intervention of Turkey will only hasten the fatal issue to that empire and Russia will now find a way to settle the Black Sea problem.

Lord Kitchener was in Dunkirk Sunday night, doubtless for the purpose of supervising operations against the allied armies. The news dispatches say that lives without number were sacrificed in the last German attempt to capture Ypres Sunday. Emperor William himself was reported present.

CROWN PRINCE FREDRICK WILLIAM OF GERMANY BADLY WOUNDED

GENEVA, Switzerland, Nov. 3.—Travelers from Strassburg say that Crown Prince Frederick William of Germany was seriously although not mortally wounded in the fighting in France, and that he has been taken to the palace at Strassburg and placed under the care of specialists from Berlin.

ITALIAN CABINET CRISIS.

ROME, Nov. 3.—Signor Salandra, premier of the cabinet, who resigned because of differences among the members regarding questions of financial policy, having been semi-officially entrusted by King Victor Emmanuel with forming a new cabinet, spent the whole of last night in consultation with his political friends as he wishes to solve the crisis in shortest possible time.

BELGIANS SAY GERMANS RETREATING.

HAVRE, France, Nov. 3.—An official communication given out by the Belgian general staff says: "The enemy has fallen back toward the east, abandoning their dead and wounded. Our troops are holding the positions they occupied yesterday. Our advance forces, which moved toward the Yser, are finding everywhere signs of a precipitate retreat."

BRITISH SINK GREEK BOAT.

BERLIN (By Wireless) Nov. 3.—According to information given out to the press in Berlin today, British cruisers have sent a Greek torpedo boat to the bottom, mistaking her for a Turkish vessel.

FRENCH AND BELGIANS UNITE

PARIS, Nov. 3.—The bombardment of Furnes, Belgium, 26 miles southwest of Bruges, by the Germans, did not prevent the review yesterday of the French and Belgian troops by President Poincaré of France, King Albert of Belgium and French War Minister Millerand. Before the review Poincaré and his party paid their respects to Queen Elizabeth of Belgium.

RELEASE MORE AMERICAN SHIPS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 3.—An official dispatch from Ambassador Page at London today indicates that the Italian vessels, San Giovanni and Regina d'Italia, laden with American copper and detained by British authorities at Gibraltar, have been permitted to proceed to their Italian destinations. It does not so state specifically.

TURKISH TROOPS NEAR EGYPT

CARIO, Egypt, Nov. 3.—Turkish troops are reported near the border, which they have not crossed. The British are fully prepared to repulse an invasion. The public in Egypt is calm and not even aware of the Turco-Russian rupture. Press censorship will be established tomorrow.

CARRANZA WILL OPEN MEX. REVOLT

CARRANZA REVOLTS
WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The latest official dispatches from Mexico City said Carranza threatened civil war unless the convention complied with his demand to retire Villa and Zapata with his resignation.

TIDE LAND CASE
WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The long litigation over the tidelands in Seattle was decided by the Supreme court in favor of the state and against the Washington Dredging and Improvement Company.

NEW MEXICAN PRESIDENT
EL PASO, Nov. 3.—The conference of revolutionary chiefs at Aguas Calientes has disregarded Carranza's protest and elected Enlilio Gutierrez provisional president of Mexico, according to official reports reaching here today.

WILSON IN 1916
WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—It became known today that men close to President Wilson are working on the understanding that he will be a candidate in 1916 despite his silence on the subject and they have begun preparations for the campaign.

INDICT NEW HAVEN HEADS
Millionaires Included in List of Accused Men in the East.
NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Criminal indictments returned today by the United States Grand Jury against twenty-one directors and former directors of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad company, including William Rockefeller, Theodore N. Vall, George F. Baker, William Skinner, Charles F. Brooker and John L. Billard. The indictments charge conspiracy in violation of the anti-trust law to monopolize commerce. The maximum penalty is a year imprisonment and \$5,000 fine.

NO AMERICANS HURT
Turkish Bombardment Did Little Harm to U. S. At Odessa.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—No Americans were injured in the Turkish bombardment of Odessa and the damage to American property was insignificant according to a report from the American Consul at Odessa.

NO SCORE IN FOOTBALL HERE

The Marshfield High School and Coquille Independent football teams played a tie game at the depot grounds this afternoon, neither side being able to score. It was hard fought throughout and in the last few minutes of play, Marshfield held Coquille for downs on the two-yard line. There was a good crowd out.

OIL SHIP IS RELEASED
WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The Standard Oil steamer Platania, which was detained at Stornaway, Scotland, has been released and proceeded to Copenhagen. The British embassy notified the State Department that this had been done after the Danish government had given assurance that her cargo of illuminating oil would not be re-exported into Germany.

OREGON TO CAST LARGE VOTE TODAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—President Wilson left this morning for Princeton to vote. He will return this afternoon in order to receive the election returns at the White House tonight.

WILSON TO VOTE GETS RETURNS HOME

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Rains Will Interfere Some Women Vote Early in Cities—All Claim Victory

PORTLAND, Nov. 3.—Rains in Western Oregon threatened to curtail the vote today especially in the rural districts. It was expected, however, that about 80 per cent of those registered would go to the polls. The women of Oregon, who were participating in their first general election, made up a majority of those voting early in the cities and towns.

DENY PERSIA MAY JOIN.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 3.—The Persian legation here declares that no alliance exists between Turkey and Persia. All rumors of such alliance, it is stated, are without foundation.

RUSSIANS ATTACK TURKS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 3.—An official communication issued here today says: "According to official reports from the Caucasian frontier, Russian troops have attacked our frontier forces at several points, but were compelled to retire. The Russians suffered losses through the energetic resistance of the Turkish troops."

TURKEY NOT FIGHTING ITALY.

BERLIN, Nov. 3. (By Wireless)—Turkey, according to an official announcement made here today, has pledged her word not to attempt an Islamic movement in Libya and therefore there is no cause for Italian uneasiness regarding Tripoli.

ALLEGED FRAUDS IN WASHINGTON

Many Watchers at Polls in Seattle As Result of Claims of Bogus Registrations
SEATTLE, Nov. 3.—The rainy weather and the enormous vote, brought on by interests in proposed prohibition law, are forecasted today in Washington. In cities polls were open from 8 to 8, in country districts they will close at 7. In Seattle, where it is alleged thousands of men fraudulently registered to vote against prohibition, there will be many watchers at the polls.

ROCKEFELLER TO AID Oil King's Millions to be Used to Assist Europeans.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—To lose no time in carrying out the decision announced to help the non-combatants in Europe with Rockefeller's millions. Rockefeller's foundation was engaged today with plans of getting the first relief ship away and immediately sending his own commission to Europe to direct further work.

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HEAVY VOTE IN ALL PRECINCTS

At 3 o'clock this afternoon the total vote cast in the four precincts was 909. In south precinct 20 the vote was 194. In Central precinct 19, 219, in north precinct the total was 130. Reports from North Bend state that the voting there is heavier than at any previous election in the city.

Throughout the four precincts of the city voting was extra heavy today and at 3 o'clock at least one of the precincts, Central No. 18, had almost as many votes cast as there were in the entire city on Saturday. All day long people flocked into the office of Justice of the Peace Pennock and there had their votes sworn in with six freeholders as witnesses. At least 70 had been taken in this way at 3 o'clock this afternoon and this not counting those who registered their vote in a similar manner at the various polls.

Sharply at 8 o'clock voting all over the state will come to a close and the counting will begin. With a long ballot it is doubtful if the returns of tonight will clearly indicate the trend of victory. Returns will be received at the Times office and bulletined through the evening from over the city, county, state and nation.

The counting of the vote in this county will be slow, although every means of message conveyance will be brought into use. The Coo and Curry County Telephone Company will bring local results and the Associated Press and Western Union will send state and national results.

GOEBEN FORCED TO WITHDRAW
PETROGRAD, Nov. 3.—A dispatch from Sebastopol says: "The former German cruiser Goeben's bombardment of the Black Sea fort was put to an end by the Constantinowicz batteries, which forced the warships to withdraw after being damaged."

FRENCH CLAIM ALLIES CONTROL YSER CROSSINGS BELOW DIXMUDE

Announce That Germans Were Compelled to Abandon Left Bank of Stream, Where Large Area Was Inundated—Allies Assume New Positions.

CLAIM FRENCH AND ALLIES HAVE MADE MARKED ADVANCES TO THE SOUTH OF DIXMUDE LATELY

Report Violent Artillery Encounters Between Rheims and Meuse Rivers and That Germans Were Checked in Forest of Argonne—Battles Along Seille.

PARIS, Nov. 3.—The official communication this afternoon says: "On our left wing the enemy seems to have completely abandoned the left bank of the Yser, down stream from Dixmude, and reconnoitres by the troops of the allies undertaken on the highways in the inundated regions were successful in occupying points of passage across the river without great difficulty."

"To the south of Dixmude and in the direction of Ghelvelt our advance was particularly perceptible. To the north of the Lys River our front was everywhere maintained or re-established by the end of the day. Despite the German attacks in the region of the Aisne, we made some progress. To the north of Chavonne and Souhir, our troops were compelled to draw back."

"There was violent cannonading between Rheims and the Meuse River as well as on the Heights of the Meuse. Further efforts on the part of the Germans in the forest of Argonne have been checked. We have continued to make progress north of Pont A Mousson. On our right wing there have been some engagements favorable to us along the River Seille."

GERMAN FLEET SINKS ENGLISH SHIPS IN BATTLE OFF CHILI

VALPARAISO, Chile, Nov. 3.—The German warships Gneisenau, Scharnhorst, Nurnberg, Leipzig and Dresden today attacked the British fleet off Coronel, Chile. The British cruiser Monmouth was sunk. The cruiser Good Hope was very badly damaged and as she was on fire is supposed to have been lost. The British cruiser Glasgow took refuge in the harbor of Coronel and is now bottled up. The German warships Scharnhorst, Nurnberg and Gneisenau anchored at midday today in Valparaiso harbor uninjured.

PLAN ATTACK ON TURKS.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—A dispatch from Tiflis, the capital of a Russian government of the same name in Trans-Caucasia, says: It is announced that the Emperor has ordered the Caucasian army to cross the frontier and attack the Turks."

SUBMARINE SINKS HERMES AND RETURNS SAFELY TO PORT

BERLIN, Nov. 3.—The German submarine which sank the British cruiser Hermes off Dover last Saturday has returned safely to port, according to an official announcement. The name of the submarine was not given.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The fortified town of Akabah in Arabia, on an arm of the Red Sea has been shelled and occupied by the British cruiser Minerva. There was some loss to troops holding the positions, but no British casualties. Akabah is 150 miles east of Suez.

The Admiralty announced this occurrence as follows: "Upon arriving at Akabah, the cruiser Minerva, Captain Warleigh, found the place occupied by soldiers and armed natives. One of the soldiers had the appearance of a German officer. The Minerva then shelled the port. The town was evacuated and landing parties from Minerva proceeded to destroy the forts, barracks, post office and stores."

RUSSIA CLAIMS TO OCCUPY PART OF EAST PRUSSIA NOW

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Star today publishes a Petrograd dispatch saying that the Russians are now securely established inside the East Prussian frontier.
