

### OUT OF PORTLAND ELDER BARBOUND

...to Arrive Here Some Time  
Tomorrow Morning Accord  
ing to Report from North.

That the steamship George W. El-  
der will not arrive here until some  
time tomorrow morning was the sub-  
stance of a message received here  
this morning from Portland. The  
message stated that the ship is barbound  
at Astoria, having left Portland yester-  
day morning. She was detained  
there until some time today when  
she was expected to be able to  
get out.

This is the second time in two  
weeks that the Elder has been put  
behind her schedule through being bar-  
bound, and neither time has the  
bar been the cause of the delay.  
The Elder was detained two  
weeks at Eureka and in only a week  
she resumed her regular schedule.

The Seattle is moving to the Upper  
Bay soon owing to the likelihood of  
rough weather.
