Lewis Will Move—A. H. Lewis has leased the M. C. Horton property on North Broadway, formerly occupied by the Times office, and will move his confectionery store in there about December 1, vacating the Sengstacken building across the street.

Closed Up House—Acting on the instructions of John Murphy, who at present lives at Empire, Constable Cox went this morning to Flagstaff and there boarded up a house belonging to Mr. Murphy which had been broken into. There was nothing taken and it was supposed that tramps used the place as a lodging house while the owner was away.

Buys Property—W. E. Bole, a Spokane railroad contractor who bought the I. S. Kaufman property on Broadway near Market and other property here sometime ago has purchased a two acre tract in Boulevard Park, near Albert Seelig's home from E. A. Anderson for \$2,000. It is said Mr. Bole plans to move here and build a fine home.

Gets Goods—Joe Houser, of the Ferndale Brewery, who has been having many troubles lately, yesterday got a part settlement of his claim against the former Hugh Sneddon saloon at Empire. Justice Pennock ordered that Houser be given possession of the liquor in the saloon which was being run by John Wasson when it was closed.

Gets Deer—H. J. McKeown is planning a venison supper one of these days soon, having brought in a three point buck which he killed last week on Mill Creek, about two miles above Wagner. The buck weighed 108 lbs and Mr. McKeown had to borrow Gus Brown's horse to bring it back to camp. Dr. Keizer intimates that he had the deer skinned out and that McKeown broke in on his preserves.

Bootlegging Case—Two men said to have given their names as Peterson and Stevens and their homes at North Bend were arrested on the new Smith-Powers line beyond Myrtle Point on the charge of bootlegging. They had a couple of salt cases full of bottles when arrested. They will be given a hearing in Coquille.

Prices Lower—There has been a big slump in the price of sugar and Saturday it was offered in wholesale lots as low as \$5.50 per hundred, a slump of about \$3.00 from the top notch war prices. Nails dropped ten cents per keg, some kinds of drugs dropped almost fifty per cent, bacon is one cent per pound lower and ham three cents per pound lower. Other commodities are also dropping.

For Elk's Club—At a meeting of the Marshfield Lodge of Elks Wednesday night, action will probably be taken on two propositions for club rooms for the lodge. One offer is said to be from the Noble estate for the second story of the building which they are going to build near the Goodrum garage on Central Avenue and the other from Wm. Grimes for the new building which he plans to erect at the corner of Central and Second.

Pranks are Criminal—To malicious break in two the tender trunks of 20 Lombardy poplars was a criminal Halloween prank played on E. A. Anderson. About his property at the corner of Ninth and Elrod are 20 of these trees, all of them set out about a year ago and growing lustily. Their career was cut short when several young men bitterly destroyed them. Mr. Anderson is in search of the guilty parties and determined to punish them to the full extent of the law.

Were Awful Dry—Having a brief respite from the drought on Saturday Lee Remington, who claims no relationship to the typewriter of that name, and Ed. Castrim secured their Sunday bottle and proceeded to make merry when they were taken in charge by the officers and this morning Castrim was assessed \$5 by Judge Butler, Remington having already left that sum in bail. Tom Morgan has stolen a bed in the parlor of the Lloyd Hotel for the past three nights and the officers at last drove him from his happy home to one furnished by the city. He also paid an assessment.

James for the twentieth time within the harbor of Refuge last evening and he spent the night in one of the city's "bird cages" where he warbled like a chirping sparrow and this morning made his debut before his old friend Police Judge Butler.
