REPUBLICANS MAKE GAINS IN CONGRESSIONAL CONTESTS ALL OVER

Incomplete Returns Show They Have Gained Fifty-four Seats, Reducing Democratic Working Majority to About Thirty-three in the Lower House.

PROGRESSIVES SHOW SLUMP EVERYWHERE EXCEPT IN CALIFORNIA WHERE GOV. JOHNSON WON OUT

New York Elects Whitman, Republican, Governor, While Massachusetts Selects Democratic Executive—Summary of Yesterday's Election Given

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The Democratic party through yesterday's elections apparently retains control of both Houses of Congress, although the gains made by Republicans in the lower House threaten to reduce the Democratic majority to a minimum. This is the outstanding feature of yesterday's elections. Otherwise the most significant feature was the dwindling away of the Progressive party. In almost every state there was a decided falling off in the Progressive vote.

COOS COUNTY VOTE IS TEN THOUSAND

Unusually Heavy Vote Polled All Over County—Over 3,000 Votes on Bay Alone

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COOS COUNTY ELECTION IS CLOSE FOR MANY OFFICES

George J. Armstrong Will Probably Have Good Lead Over Dyer and Curtis for County Commissioner—Barrow Has Probably Defeated Tom Hall.

WITHYCOMBE AND CHAMBERLAIN WILL PROBABLY HAVE MAJORITIES IN THIS COUNTY—BOOTH CLOSE

Sheriff Gage Has Probably Defeated Alfred Johnson, Jr., for Sheriff—S. P. Peirce Given Close Run in Some Places by Adolphsen for the Legislature

With the count still far from complete in many of the larger precincts, and the returns coming in very slow, the results of the Coos County election are far from decisive.

However, it appears that C. R. Barrow, of Coquille, has defeated Tom Hall, of Marshfield, for State Representative.

A. Adolphsen is giving S. P. Peirce a hard race for Joint Representative, but Peirce seems certain of winning.

For County Surveyor, Mr. McCullough, of Bandon, apparently has a safe lead over A. N. Gould.

The County Commissioner fight is close, but it seems certain that Geo. J. Armstrong will be re-elected, although Dyer carried Bandon against him and E. B. Curtis carried many of the Bay precincts.

Fred Hollister will probably have a slight majority in the county over W. C. Hawley, but this is not certain.

Booth and Chamberlain are running close for United States Senator, but Chamberlain will probably carry the county.

For Governor, Withycombe will have a good lead over Dr. Smith.

James Watson is running about two to one over Justice Stanley for County Judge, most of the voters passing on it.

Robert Watson appears to have a good lead over Collier for County Clerk, although Collier gave him a strong race in the Coquille Valley.

Race for Port Commissioner
The race for Port Commissioner on Coos Bay has developed an unexpected contest. A. H. Powers and A. O. Rogers are re-elected but someone made a "gum-shoe" fight on Henry Sngstacken with the result that Ludwig Kjelland of Kentuck Inlet is running close to Mr. Sengstacken.

COOS COUNTY GOES DRY BY MAJORITY OF PROBABLY TWO THOUSAND

Coos County is going dry by a big majority, which may exceed 2000. Practically every town in the county with the exception of Lakeside, went dry.

Two precincts in North Bend where the count was completed this afternoon, went dry by a considerable majority and the count in the others indicated North Bend would be dry.

Marshfield is running fairly close, but some of the election officials said that the final count would show Marshfield between 100 and 200 dry.

Coquille was reported going dry at the rate of four to one. Bandon gave a dry majority of about 200.

Eastside went dry. Empire divided even and South Slough went dry by one.

In the Coos River precinct where the Blue Ridge Tigers vote, there was an overwhelming dry majority, and it was said that out of the 76 Blue Ridge Tigers voting, only one voted wet.

The South Central Marshfield precinct alone will, it is estimated from the incomplete count, give a majority of between seventy-five and eighty for the drys.

JAPS ATTACK TSING TAU

TOKIO, Nov. 4.—7:30 p. m.—A dispatch received here from Tsi Nan, in Shan Tung province, China, says Japanese forces have destroyed 26 German guns and captured 800 prisoners before Tsing Tau. Japanese artillery is now attacking the German trenches and the wire entanglements before them.
