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CHAMBERLAIN DEFEATS BOOTH BY BY OVER TWENTY THOUSAND

Has Majority of Over Seven Thousand in Returns From Less Than Half of Precincts in State—Even Ran Ahead of Booth in Lane County Precincts.

M'ARTHUR WINS, GIVING OREGON THREE REPUBLICAN MEMBERS OF HOUSE — HAWLEY WON TWO TO ONE

Hollister Unable to Overcome Big Republican Majority—Eight Hour Law Defeated and Prohibition Carries by Big Majority — Late Returns

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 5.—Returns from all counties indicated that Geo. E. Chamberlain would receive a majority of about 20,000 for United States Senator over R. A. Booth, Republican. He carried more counties than six years ago.

Withycombe, Republican, apparently will have a majority for Governor of over 30,000. In addition to the election of all three Congressmen, the Republicans seem to have carried their complete state ticket.

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 5.—With nine counties missing and 24 incomplete, exclusive of Multnomah, prohibition leads by 18,401. Chamberlain is leading in the same number of counties over Booth by 9043. Hawley, Republican, leads Hollister, Democrat, for Congress in the first district, by 11,735. With returns from eight counties, Sinnott, Republican, leads in the second district by 4867. Withycombe, Republican, leads Smith, Democrat, for Governor by 7616 in 24 incomplete counties, exclusive of Multnomah.

The "drys" have carried every county that has reported, with the single exception of Multnomah. The "dry" vote in the counties covered shows 46,778, and "wet", 28,377.

Chamberlain's vote is 45,670. Booth's 37,608, and Hanley's, 5003. Hanley's largest vote, aside from Multnomah, was in Coos County. Booth carried Clatsop, Columbia, Lane, Morrow and Tillamook and has a prospect of carrying a few Eastern Oregon counties. All the rest of the counties have gone to Chamberlain. Booth has barely carried his own county of Lane and he has apparently lost Marion.

WET AND DRY VOTE

The latest returns from 311 precincts complete out of 336 in Multnomah County, showed that the wets are leading by 125 votes. This small lead is not expected to affect the estimated majority from the state of 40,000 for prohibition. The same precincts give Chamberlain for Senator 32,494, and Booth, 23,819. McArthur is 2616 votes ahead of Flegel for Congress, McArthur's vote being 24,286 and Flegel's 21,670.

Withycombe continued to increase his big lead over Smith for Governor, in Multnomah County. Bean, McBride, Benson and Harris, Republicans, apparently have been elected to the Supreme Court.

Galloway, Democrat, is a close fifth. The Republicans elected all other state officers.

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 5.—The election of Senator Chamberlain appeared to be assured by returns received late yesterday afternoon. Returns from 669 precincts out of 1467 in Oregon gave Chamberlain 32,574; Booth, 25,716; Hanley, 6,185.

Chamberlain was running ahead of Booth in the latter's home county, Lane.

McArthur was elected Representative in the third district, thus giving the Republicans all three Congressmen. Of the 326 precincts in the third Congressional district, 110 counted in part gave Flegel, Democrat, 3334; Lafferty, Independent, 2565; McArthur, Republican, 4640.

For Governor returns from 561 precincts partially counted, but with every county heard from, give Gill, Progressive, 930; Smith, Democrat, 16,934; U'Ren, Independent, 1441; Withycombe, Republican, 24,627.

The same precincts gave on prohibition, yes, 13,840; no, 9951.

Last Returns Show Drys Have Lead of 8000 and This Will be Increased

LARGE CITIES FAIL TO STAY THE TIDE

Humphrey Elected Congressman and Robert Hodge Becomes Sheriff at Seattle

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 5.—Returns from 1645 precincts, including four of the largest counties, King, Spokane, Pierce and Snohomish, nearly completed, and Whatcom County complete, give, for prohibition, 147,310; against, 139,100. The remaining precincts should increase the prohibition majority greatly.

Chief of Police Griffiths of Seattle, Progressive Congressional candidate in the first district, ran strong, second to Representative Humphrey, Republican. Ex-Mayor Moore, Democrat, was third.

Robert Hodge, defeated Progressive candidate for Governor two years ago, was elected Sheriff of the county.

FINAL VOTE GIVEN

SEATTLE, Nov. 5.—Seventeen hundred and twenty-eight precincts give prohibition 151,467 against 141,787. Every county has been heard from and the big counties reported in full.

The plurality of Senator Jones, Republican, probably will reach 30,000.

OREGON IS DRY BY OVER 40,000

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 5.—All the candidates for the more important offices increased their leads over their opponents today. Twelve counties complete outside of Multnomah give prohibition a lead of 12,010. The "drys" are leading in Multnomah and as the scattered returns from every county in the state indicate, nearly all will give a dry majority of 40,000.

MEAT FAMINE IS NOW LIKELY

Chicago Stockyards to be Closed Owing to Hoof and Mouth Disease Epidemic

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—The danger of a meat famine resulting from the closing tomorrow of the Union Stock Yards to stamp out a foot and mouth disease among the stock is remote, officials of the leading packing companies announced today. Prices will not be perceptibly affected as the storage houses are well supplied with meat.

WHEAT PRICE RECORD BROKEN

ENGLISH CRUISERS LOST AFTER BATTLE WITH THE GERMAN FLEET

Warships Reported to Have Escaped After Engagement Off Coronel Not in Chilean Ports and Whereabouts Cannot be Ascertained by Officials.

SUCCESSFUL GERMAN VESSELS ALSO MISSING AND MAY MEAN FIVE BRITISHERS WERE SUNK

Germans Begin New Drive for French seacoast but French Claims Are That Allies Have Been Reinforced and Started Counter Movement Against Kaiser

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—No British warships are in Chilean ports. The fate of the three British cruisers that engaged five German war ships off the coast of Chile and the transport that accompanied them remains a mystery. On this mystery is based the British hope that one or two of their vessels survived the action. A dispatch from Santiago today disposes of the earlier reports that the cruiser Glasgow and the transport Otranto were bottled up in Chilean waters by the German cruisers Leipzig and Bremen. The whereabouts of the two latter vessels is also in doubt.

A new drive for the seacoast of the heavily reinforced German forces in Belgium has been met by counter offensive movements of the augmented allied armies in the vicinity of Ypres. The French official statement says the Franco-British line have nowhere been drawn back and have made notable progress in several places. Great Britain formally annexed the Island of Cyprus in the Mediterranean, which was under the suzerainty of the Turkish Sultan.

The Russians claim the Germans are falling back not only in Russian Poland, but also on the East Prussian frontier and the Russian troops have penetrated at points on the East Prussian border. The Russian War Office announces Russian troops entered Turkish Armenia, defeated the Turks and occupied four towns.

GERMANS WON GREAT VICTORY IN BATTLE OFF THE CHILEAN COAST

VALPARAISO, Chile, Nov. 5.—The victory of the German fleet under Admiral von Spee consisting of the armored cruisers Scharnhorst and Genisemau and the light cruisers Nürnberg, Lepic and Bremen over the British squadron made up of the cruisers Monmouth, Good Hope and Glasgow and the Transport Otranto commanded by Rear Admiral Craddock continues the sensation of the hour here. The Germans were able to sink or scatter British squadrons with only minor damage to their own ships and the casualty list of only two wounded. The Monmouth is known to have been lost with practically all her crew. The Good Hope was severely damaged and on fire and is believed to have sunk when she fled, while the Glasgow and Otranto took refuge in Chilean ports it appears. The German vessels are still in harbor here coaling and provisioning.

ENGLISH SILENT; CALLS JAPS' AID.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The English officials were silent yesterday regarding the naval engagement off the Chilean coast Sunday. The American Minister at Santiago, Henry P. Fletcher, however, confirms the reports of the German naval victory which put five British warships out of action. Until the British Admiralty shall speak, the extent of their loss will not be known. It is reported that the Japanese-British fleet that has been operating near the islands the Pacific is rushing to attack the victorious Germans.

JAPS CLAIM TO BE CLOSING IN ON GERMAN TSING TAU FORTS

TOKIO, Nov. 5.—It has been officially announced that the bombardment of Tsing Tau continues vigorously. The Germans on the night of November 2 made a counter attack which for a time hindered operations, the attacking forces gradually closing in. Yesterday the Japanese right flank captured some small forts. The shells struck and burned Busmarck Barracks, the shells falling into the street. A power house was also destroyed.

FRENCH REPORT GEN. VON KLUCK HAS DIED IN NAMUR HOSPITAL

PARIS, Nov. 5.—A correspondent at Havre says he has from a source which he cannot designate, news of the death of General Von Kluck ten days ago in a hospital at Namur, where he was treated for a wound in the head.

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
