Mr. Foote is allowed seven days to reply to the summons that was served on him today.

**New Firm.**—Messrs. Stevens and Goldsworthy have taken over the Parisian Cleaning and Dyeing Works at Second and Market and are arranging to develop the business rapidly. Mr. Goldsworthy is an expert in this line of work and Mr. Stevens who was formerly at Camp One and recently with the Gardiner Mill Co., is well known in this section.

**Recovers Lost Boat.**—The hunting skiff belonging to Gordon Smith and Harold Stutsman, which was stolen or turned loose several days ago from the dock in the rear of the fire station, has been recovered. At the Eastside dock Smith found the boat tied up and inside a new pair of nine-foot oars which he immediately confiscated as "trophies of war."

**Made Quick Time.**—Commodore Dave Holden received word this morning that a party of twelve which he took out on the Gasco yesterday morning arrived in Portland last evening at 10:30, which he thinks is the best time ever made out of here during the rainy season. He says that if the tides are favorable later, they will be able to make the afternoon trip down from Florence and bring people in from Portland in one day.

**Illness Causes Return.**—Max Reigard, a sophomore at the University of Oregon, has been forced to return to his home on account of illness, which kept him four weeks from his classes. Shortly after going back to Eugene for the beginning of his second year, Mr. Reigard was taken ill and his forced absence from college was long enough to cause him to give up hopes of passing his subjects for this semester. **Wrongful Attachment.**—Because of wrongful attachment of goods belonging to J. H. Olmstead, the Coos Bay Grocery Company was fined \$20 in Justice Court this morning. About two weeks ago some personal effects belonging to Olmstead were on the dock at North Bend ready for shipment. Constable Emery, there to attach goods of Joe Willis for an unpaid account, also took in those belonging to Olmstead. Personal effects are always exempt from attachment, according to Justice Pennoek, hence the action was illegal. Olmstead sued for \$250 damages.

**North Bend Paper.**—B. B. Weldy and R. E. Weldy of Chester, Mont., are at North Bend conferring with Sec. Smith of the Chamber of Commerce and others there relative to establishing a morning paper in North Bend. Messrs. Weldy have been running a syndicate of weekly papers at Chester and surrounding towns, but five successive crop failures there have made the field rather poor. Mr. Weldy says he is highly pleased with the prospects here. He has been negotiating with Edgar Daniels for the purchase of The Harbor plant but Mr. Daniels has converted his paper into a semi-weekly and does not care to give up the field. Mr. Weldy expects to leave tomorrow for his home and expects to return to the Bay ready to start in business about January 1.
