Will Discuss Drainage.—At the meeting of the City Council to be held this evening, the question of the drainage of the north arm of Mill Slough will probably receive its share of attention and if possible the city fathers will settle the long-standing question of drainage of the pond that has long been a nuisance to the residents of the neighborhood.

Finish Excavation.—Excavation 160 feet square for the new \$10,000 high school gymnasium, was completed yesterday by the crew working under Robert Kellong, who has the contract for the work, and today the men started on the digging of the basement and the swimming tank, which will extend below the level of the basement. This will be about 21 by 40 feet in dimension. Dirt taken from the side of the hill has been spread out to grade up the terrace in front of the high school.

Goods Sold for Judgment.—For a judgment of \$42.78 against J. S. Ward, who left here for San Francisco some time ago, a public auction was held of his household effects which remained unshipped at the Ocean Dock. The bill was owed to the Warner Grocery Company and the fact that the auction was advertised for several weeks and other costs piled up, less than \$7 was left to turn over to the creditors after Constable Cox had finished with the sale.

Shaw, accompanied by her two young sons, left this morning by way of Mapleton for her home in Nova Scotia, where she was called on account of the serious illness of her father, who is now an old man more than 80 years of age. On Thursday a letter was received from her sister stating that the father had been sinking for several days and a telegram later stated that the end is near.
