UNITED STATES SERVES MEALS DAILY TO STARVED BELGIUM

RELIEF PLANS INCLUDE SENDING SUPPLIES TO ALL PARTS OF INTERIOR—ALL PAY WHO HAVE FUNDS—OFFICIALS DESCRIBE SITUATION

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times)
LONDON, Nov. 12.—Provisions sent to Brussels by the American commission for the relief of Belgium are supplying 400,000 meals daily. Plans are now complete for carrying on a similar work throughout that part of Belgium occupied by Germans.

The Dutch steamer Jan-Bloek has sailed loaded with 2000 tons of wheat, rice, peas, beans and flour and it is expected that the Dutch steamer Tellus will leave tomorrow with 1700 tons of wheat. Both ships will proceed to Rotterdam, where their cargoes will be taken over by representatives of the American commission.

Rich and Poor in Line.
Herbert Clark Hoover, chairman of the American commission, received the following telegram from Captain T. F. Lucey, the commission's representative at Rotterdam:

"Langhorne, Wyman and Bell (Morris M. Langhorne, secretary of the American legation to the Netherlands and Luxemburg; E. B. Wyman, member of the relief commission, and Edward Bell, second secretary of the American Embassy at London) have returned from Brussels, where 400,000 meals a day are being issued. Those people who are able to pay are being charged 5 cents for the meals. The meals cost 15 cents and Bell says that rich and poor stand in line for these meals, as it is the only way they can get food.

To Reach All Belgium
"They state that complete plans have been entered into by the central committee for receiving and distributing supplies throughout all Belgium. The country has been divided into provinces, each province handling its own distribution and being represented by two members on the central committee. All requisitions on this office will come from the central committee through the American and Spanish Ministers. A subcommittee in turn will sell food to the communes, which will resell or distribute free to those in need.

"The subcommittees are formed generally by members of the town councils, so that the whole organization has an official and unquestionable standing. They are all in accord and are holding meetings from time to time at Brussels and compiling data as to the needs of every district, regardless of how remote. The people are elated at the shipments and the practical results given.

Uneasy Regarding Supplies
"Some uneasiness is felt here by Belgians as the result of quotations from the American press to the effect that supplies would be seized by the military authorities. They are afraid that this will stop the shipment of supplies. I have assured them that the supplies would come regardless of these unfounded suppositions.

"Whitlock (Brand Whitlock, the American Minister to Belgium) is personally supervising and compiling the detailed requirements of the various districts to be forwarded to you."

Emergencies Are Forestalled.
That all emergencies are being forestalled is evident from a note issued by the central committee in Belgium, in which it is said that the commission will have a delegate in each province who will see that the shipment of food supplies arrives intact and who must be informed of any infraction by the German troops of the guarantees given by Field Marshal Baron Von Der Goltz, military governor of the occupied portion of Belgium.

If this delegate, protected by the American flag, learns of any such infraction, he will verify it and immediately call attention to it, when the Ministers of Spain and America will make proper representations to the German authorities.

At a meeting of the Belgian central committee, Ernest Solvay, the Belgian manufacturer, who is a member of this committee, in thanking the American and Spanish Ministers for the service rendered to Belgium said that the population of

CURRY COUNTY TO AID IN EXHIBIT

J. A. Ward Back from Two-Weeks' Trip After Displays For Exposition

Curry county will contribute approximately \$700 to the Coos and Curry county exhibit for the Panama-Pacific Exposition, declares J. A. Ward, who has just returned from a two weeks' trip through the country to the south, gathering exhibits and arousing enthusiasm toward the sending to San Francisco of one of the best displays of the entire state.

But to arouse enthusiasm Mr. Ward found exceedingly difficult in some places, the people stating that taxes are too high for them to take up other expenditures, while at other points along his route he found some of the most indulgent boosters of either county.

"At Brookings," said Mr. Ward, "I didn't even have to explain the cause of my visit before the people were hand over hand ready to help in every way possible." The Brookings Mill and the Macleay Estate have both contributed to the exhibition fund and are also sending special displays for the Coos and Curry County space in the Oregon building.

In some places where he found money hard to get Mr. Ward found the commissioners ready to make the necessary appropriations providing the tax-payers were willing to back them up. To settle this difficulty, petitions were gotten out and freely circulated with the desired effect and the money was secured.

Altogether Mr. Ward ported 240 miles on his trip, a good portion of which was made on horseback, on stage and on foot. Below Langlois he arranged for wool samples and at many of the mining centers various sorts of mineral exhibits were secured, especial among which are the iron and copper ores of Gold Beach.

North of Brookings were gathered samples of borax in the valuable deposits belonging to the "20 Mule Team Borax Company." But of all the exhibits gathered Mr. Ward is most interested in the agate display, the collection of J. H. Stewart at Port Orford being, according to his belief, the best of any on the entire Pacific coast. An old pioneer in this country, Mr. Stewart has for years collected his agates, making this a hobby.

A little at a time he has sorted over these stones until only the best are left and still he has on hand more than a bushel and a half of stones yet uncut. Collections are also being submitted by F. E. Woodcock and Mrs. Knapp of Port Orford.

Having completed his work for the time being in the south, Mr. Ward will resume his work of making a collection of the Oregon sea foods as they grow along the neighboring shores. Either today or tomorrow he is expected to leave for the beach, especially for his collection of rock oysters which he expects to can.
