Geese Flying.—Yesterday and last night hundreds of thousands of geese passed over Coos Bay, flying southerly, indicating a storm or cold weather in the north. It has been a long time since so many geese passed over Coos Bay. Yesterday they were flying high, but last evening their continual "honk honk" kept many from going to sleep.

Launches New Boat.—M. H. Reiber proudly came down from North Bend this morning in a new 27-foot gasoline boat that he has just launched after building his craft in his warehouse this last summer. The cabin on the boat is not yet complete and the owner brought the boat here today to finish outfitting her. Mr. Reiber will use the boat for his own personal use.

For New Road.—The county commissioners have granted the petition of J. P. Morris, L. W. Traver and others asking for a new county road to connect up North Eleventh street with Sherman avenue, which will make a direct route over the new highway to Empire. The route will be surveyed soon and the voters will then pass on the feasibility of the project.

Crew Leaves.—Supt. Ashby of the Warren Construction Company stated today that he had closed up all his paving work here. He said that he was not going to do the patchwork on Central avenue and elsewhere which the Coos Bay Water company had to cut in order to repair mains. These have been the cause of much trouble. Part of Mr. Ashby's crew left today, but it will be some time before he departs.

Drop Iron in Bay.—Attempting to land a box containing 600 ponds of scrap iron onto the Willamette Pacific dock at North Bend, W. M. The heavy box dropped in twenty-two feet of water and probably will not be recovered. It contained mostly scrap iron.
