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GERMANS CLAIM STEADY GAINS AGAINST ALLIES ON ALL SIDES

Rainy and Stormy Weather, Berlin Official Announcement Says, Is Making Progress Slow in Battle of Flanders—Capture Many Near Ypres

ANNOUNCE ENGLISH ATTACK NEAR LILLE WAS REPULSED AND FRENCH LOSING AT BERRY AU BAC

Declare Fighting Continues in East Prussia Without Definite Results But That Many Prisoners Have Been Taken and One Russian Corp Repulsed

BERLIN, Nov. 14.—(By Wireless.)—The military headquarters gave out the following today: "Fighting in western Flanders continues. Our attacks during the last few days have been impeded by rain and stormy weather and therefore are proceeding slowly. South of Ypres, we have taken 700 prisoners. British attacks west of Lille have been repulsed. At Berry Au Bac, we compelled the French to evacuate a commanding position. Our attack in the forest of Argonne made good progress. Here the French again suffered heavily, leaving more than 150 prisoners in our hands. The fighting continues in East Prussia and at Stallupoenen we took 500 Russian prisoners. No decision has yet been reached at Soldau. In the district of Vlaclawec, the Russian army corps has been repulsed and 1500 prisoners and 12 machine guns captured."

ALLIES TRY HARD TO TAKE DIXMUDE

Heavy Reinforcements Brought Up—Germans Strengthen Fortifications

LONDON, Nov. 14.—Telegraphing from the Belgian frontier, the Express correspondent sends the following: "Heavy reinforcements have been brought up before Dixmude by the Allies, who have resumed the offensive with great vigor and there is every indication of an early re-occupation of the town by them. Fresh German entrenchments are being dug for the purpose of holding the town and big guns have been sent forward to the new positions. The roads behind the town are filled with German ammunition wagons. During the attacks Thursday by the French, the Germans placed a mitrailleuse in the tower of the railway station which enabled them to command the southern approaches and beat back successive bodies of infantry approaching the town."

BOMB OUTRAGE IS PREVENTED TODAY

Quick Action of New York Policeman Thwarts Another Disaster to Whitman

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—A bomb somewhat similar in construction to the one that wrecked the entrance to the Bronx County Court house last Wednesday night, was found today in the Tombs court room, just under the District Attorney's offices, occupied by Governor-elect Whitman. The room was crowded. The bomb contained gun powder, slugs and bullets. Policeman George L. O'Connor saw smoke from the burning fuse of the bomb, ran to the spot, cut off the fuse and carried the bomb from the court room. A young Italian who was seen in the room soon before the explosion, is suspected. He lighted a match, but did so as if he was lighting a cigarette.

BATTLE AND MUTINY IN EGYPT NOW

Disaster to Third Largest Ship in English Navy Was Kept Secret at London

GERMAN SUBMARINE OR MINE CAUSED LOSS

Olympic Rescues 800 Men on Board—One Sailor Killed—Think Torpedo Did It

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Ruinous disaster to the British super-dreadnaught Audacious, which has persisted ever since the White Star liner Olympic, diverted from her course, arrived at Lough Swilly October 29, are confirmed in mail advices received today by the Associated Press from a point in Ireland. After a career of less than two years, the Audacious, third in tonnage and armament of the British warship line at the bottom of the ocean off the north coast of Ireland. She was hit by a torpedo or disabled by a mine October 27. With the possible exception of one or two men, the whole crew of 800 men and officers were rescued by small boats from the Olympic.

EPIDEMIC HURTS PORTLAND SHOW

Only Butcher Stock to be Shown at Pacific Livestock Exposition There

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 14.—The management of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, to be held here December 7 to 12, announced today that after conferences with Federal officials and Governor West, it was decided to exhibit no breeding stock at the exposition. In view of the danger of spreading the foot and mouth disease it was believed that it would be dangerous to show cattle that would be sent back to their owners. Only stock that will be slaughtered will be shown, but the management promises an extensive exhibit.

NEW MAN, HERE. Edward S. Fawcett Becomes Identified With R. Von Shipman. Edward S. Fawcett, of Los Angeles, has recently come to Marshfield with the intention of making this his permanent home upon the arrival of his mother, who expects to come to the Bay in the near future. Mr. Fawcett has just been appointed a special representative of the Builders' Park property by R. Von Shipman, who has recently visited this property, with the intention of making it one of the most desirable residence sub-divisions of Marshfield. At the present time the Park is being cleared and by spring the streets will be cleared and rough graded so that almost every lot will be accessible.

SANTA CLAUS SHIP SAILS FOR EUROPE

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—With more than 1200 tons of Christmas gifts from the people of America, a Santa Claus ship, the naval collier Jason, sailed today for Europe. A message of Godspeed from President Wilson was received by Lieutenant Commander Courtney before sailing. The decks, as the ship sailed, were black with thousands of school children. The gifts came from every state of the Union and included everything from toys and dolls, to food and clothing. They will be distributed in England, France, Germany, Belgium, Russia and Holland.

FRENCH CLAIM GERMANS LOSING AT MANY POINTS OF BATTLE

Official Paris Announcement Today Declares Kaiser's Advance Towards North French Seacoast Has Been Checked—Attacks Repulsed Near Ypres Today

ANNOUNCE FRENCH FORCES HAVE ADVANCED BETWEEN LABASSE CANAL AND ARRAS

Fighting Resumed With Greater Intensity in Argonne and Germans' Efforts to Re-capture Two Points Defeated—Bad Weather Hampers Operations Along Line (By Associated Press to The Cooz Bay Times.)

PARIS, Nov. 14.—A French official communication this afternoon says: "In Belgium the attack against the head of a bridge at Nieuport resulted in failure, and various offensive movements by the enemy in the region to the east and southeast of Ypres have been checked. In the environs of Bixchoote we progressed one kilometer toward the east. Between the canal of LaBasse and Arras our troops made minor progress. In the region of Lassigny and in the vicinity of the Aisne river the Germans attacked without success. In the Argonne fighting recommenced with greater spirit. The enemy has endeavored in vain to recapture Four De Paris and St. Hubert. Particularly in the vicinity of Verdun several partial offensive movements by the Germans were checked. In the Woivre district and Lorraine, where bad weather prevails, there is nothing new."

AUSTRIANS STILL WINNING. VIENNA, Nov. 14.—An official telegram from the southern war theater, states that attacks on blockhouses and strongly fortified positions, together with the pursuit of the enemy, continued on the whole front Wednesday. The line east of Nukucani and Novoselo, on the river Save, was reached by the Austrian troops. The Serbians are in full retreat. Four guns, 14 munition cars and numerous prisoners were captured.

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In spite of the last few days of foggy weather, our troops have not ceased to make progress little by little. They are established almost everywhere at distances varying from 300 to 500 meters from the network of barbed wire entanglements of the enemy. To the north of the Aisne River we have taken possession of Tracy Le Val. We made slight progress to the northeast of Soissons.
