The recital given as a benefit in behalf of the Norwegian Lutheran Chapel at North Bend Thursday last by Henrik Gjerdrum, assisted by Mrs. Franklin E. Conway, was very well patronized.

Mr. Gjerdrum convinced his hearers in the first two numbers of his fine musicianship. The Beethoven "Minuet" being played with grace and clearness and the "Ecosaise," by the same composer, with much brilliancy.

In all the following numbers Mr. Gjerdrum had a fine opportunity to show his versatility, his playing being remarkably clear, rhythmic and powerful in conception.
Special mention must be made of the beautiful rendition of the "Finnish Folk Song," by Merikanto, which left a lasting impression.

As the program proceeded the audience grew very enthusiastic. As encores Mr. Gjerdrum played "Crescendo" by Lassen and a Norwegian "Caprice" by Ole Olsen.

Mrs. Conway was in fine voice. She very pleasingly gave the song: "Were My Song with Wings Provided,"—Hahn, and the aria "One Fine Day"—Madam Butterfly, by Puccini. In the latter she reached great artistic heights, her expression and inflexion being remarkable. The group of Scandinavian songs was enthusiastically received, her pronunciation of the Norwegian and Swedish being very good. Mrs. Conway responded to the persistent applause with Mrs. Beach's well known "The Years at the Spring."

As an accompanist, Mr. Gjerdrum proved himself an artist of ability. The whole program was well chosen especially for the occasion. Quite a number of Marshfield musicians were present. It is to be hoped that Mrs. Conway and Mr. Gjerdrum will give a number of such fine programs this season.

Great interest is taken by the public in general in the Red Cross Benefit Concert to be given at the Masonic Opera House November 27. The program promises to be one of great enjoyment. The vocalists will be Mrs. Mayme Stanley Gidley, Mrs. R. E. Miller and Mr. Benjamin Ostlund. The Chaminade Club will appear under the direction of Mrs. Wm. Horsfall, Jr. Miss Edna Larson and Mr. Henrik Gjerdrum will be the piano soloists. A feature on the program will be the Singing—variations for two pianos to be played by Mr. Gjerdrum and Miss Larson. This work is probably the greatest work for two pianos ever written. It is full of color and variety and wonderfully orchestral in its effects. Tickets for the concert are now for sale at the Busy Corner and the Central avenue pharmacy.
