**Two Cases Up.**—Judge Coke held a special adjourned session of circuit court at Coquille yesterday to hear arguments in the case of the Coach Estate vs. the Cody Lumber Company and also in the Kirkpatrick will case from Coquille.

**To Hold Meeting.**—According to an announcement a meeting of the deacons and trustees of the Swedish church will be held at the church hall next Tuesday evening, November 17, at 7:30 p. m., and it is asked that these officers attend.

**Was Pretty Drunk.**—August Ancun spent the night in the city jail after having been picked up early in the evening with pretty much of a "jag" on. "Sense me, Judge," he pleaded this morning and was charged only \$5 for the all-night berth.

**Preacher Goes North.**—Rev. T. B. McDonald, for five years pastor of the Christian church at Coquille has left with his family by way of Mapleton for Cottage Grove, where he goes to take up new duties. He left behind him many friends sorry to see his departure.

**Will Move.**—Chas. Stauff has decided to move his grocery from the Butler block at Front and Commercial on December 1. He is uncertain yet about a new location and may possibly not open at once. Norton & Hanson will use the room he is vacating and later may start a men's furnishing goods store there.

**Campbell Leaves.**—Railroad Commissioner Campbell left today for Salem. He said last night that his first opinion about the water company being wrong in charging step rates from large consumers might be in error as yesterday he found a number of cases in other places where such was permitted. He said that he would look the matter up more fully when he reached Salem.

**Dalley Released.**—As a result of being able to get good letters of recommendation from former employers, Edward Dalley was ordered released by Judge Coke yesterday. Dalley served forty days for the theft of entables from the Hauser & Hauser camp. He admitted taking entable, but said he was intoxicated and without funds. Judge Coke told him that the balance of his sentence

would be suspended during good behavior.  
**Rev. Hall to Speak.**—Rev. G. Le Roy Hall will speak at Bunker Hill tomorrow afternoon and in the evening will go to the Eastport school house to conduct services and a general invitation has been extended to the public to attend.

Attorneys Hoy and Miller, J. W. Bennett and Tom T. Bennett appeared for the guardian and W. T. Stoll and C. R. Peck for Mr. Sneddon.

**Commercial Club Rooms.**—Through an error it was stated yesterday that the men on the Dredge Seattle had arranged to use the North Bend Chamber of Commerce quarters as a recreation room. It should have stated the North Bend Commercial Club Rooms. The Commercial Club, although owning the fixtures and furnishings in the Winsor and Falkenstein building, discontinued some time ago and are leasing the furnished apartments to the dredge men.

**Become Citizens.**—Three brothers born in Germany went today to Coquille and took out their naturalization papers. They were Alex, Gus and Ted Peterson. Gus Peterson is an engineer at the North Bend Manufacturing Company and Alex Peterson is a machinist at the Smith mill. The third brother is also a machinist, having come here but a short time ago from Portland. They were accompanied to the county seat by Manager Justen of the St. Lawrence Hotel, who went as a witness for the men.

**Minister Here.**—Rev. I. Stubbfield, formerly of Kansas City but for the past three years located at Kinmath Falls, arrived here today to consider a call from the Marshfield Presbyterian church. He came in via Roseburg and had a very hard trip to Myrtle Point, not reaching there until midnight last night, their auto breaking down and taking six hours to go from Canas to Rock Creek. He will officiate at both services here tomorrow. His subject for the morning service will be "Power," and for the evening "A Talk on the Shepherd's Psalm."

**Turkey Thief at Work.**—With the great national turkey day close at hand and probably acting under the belief that fowls will come high at that time, a turkey thief broke into the yard of Julius Nelson, on Haynes Inlet, a few nights ago and got away with a monstrous big "feed" in the shape of Mr. Nelson's largest turkey. Footprints of the thief were found the next morning and by means of these the thief was traced for a little way from the farm to the place where the fowl was killed to keep it from making a noise. Mr. Nelson declares he is willing to pay a reward for the apprehension of the thief.

**Patronize Home Industry.**—An appeal to practically every man and woman of Coos county is being made by the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce when today there was sent from the headquarters three circulars by the hundreds, mailed all over the county, asking the people to patronize home industry by buying the articles produced on the Bay, and special mention was made of the soap, cigars and mattresses made in this vicinity, all of which, declare the circulars, are up to the standard of outside brands and are sold on the market at prices as reasonable or even more so.

**Local Geese Caused Riot Call.**—The big flight of geese the night before last caused S. J. Immel to recall a peculiar experience that he witnessed a number of years ago. He was in Aurora, Mo., a big flight of geese started and the electric lights on the hills in the town dazzled the geese and they circled around lower and lower. As a result the citizen turned out and killed hundreds of them. The shrill cries of the geese and the shooting caused people in another part of town to suspect a riot and they turned in a riot call for the police. There was a grand rush to the hills and soon a thousand or more people were assembled and the police and all joined in the slaughter of the geese.

**Want Fair Money.**—Six hundred dollars, at the rate of \$50 a month, will be asked of the City Council by the entire executive council of the Chamber of Commerce. This is asked as Marshfield's contribution to the \$5000 Coos and Curry county exhibit at the Panama Pacific Exposition. Such action was decided yesterday at a meeting of the executive committee.
