She is a niece who will inherit the ranch property that Negithon had. The following letter has been received by Mr. Mullen: "Police Department, Copenhagen, October 3, 1914. "Mr. J. G. Mullen, North Bend, Oregon: Acknowledging your letter of Aug. 26th, I herewith inform you that the deceased, John W. Negithon, had a brother whose name was Hans Peter William Negithon, and who died in this city March 17th, 1902.

The last named Negithon has been married twice. His first wife, Christina Negithon, from whom he was divorced, is living in this city, Flekegrade, 13 I. There was one daughter by this first marriage, Alfreda Negithon, born July 9, 1888, and is now living with her mother. His second wife, Petrea Negithon, lives in this city, England Way 12 I. CITY COUNCIL TO HEAR CLUB PLAN

Sentiment Grows Favoring Establishment of Coffee Club Free Employment Bureau

Sentiment in favor of a local Coffee Club and Free Employment Bureau has made itself felt and pronounced during the past few days and at the next meeting of the City Council the matter will be placed before that body for their discussion. That a Coffee Club is a correct means of bringing employer and employee together, in the belief and acting with this view, a reading room and restaurant are also to be furnished, thus making two other departments in such a concern that are of prime value to the men who have no places to go when they come to town and also who are in search of work.

As to whether or not such a club should be organized under the city government is a matter of discussion, the consensus of opinion being that a Club could be better managed by private bodies.

Confronted with the problem of the unemployed last winter, Governor West appointed a committee of prominent state laboring men to confer with similar committees in California and Washington for the purpose of drawing up a legislative bill providing for co-operative system of Coffee Clubs to be similar in all three states.

Under these provisions Clubs would be established in laboring centers of each state. Toward the organization the state would pay one-third of a \$2000 capitalization for each club, the county one third and the city in which they are established, one third. Control of these Clubs would be through volunteer committees. With this system established it was hoped that labor could be properly distributed over each state or the states, and would eliminate the helpless crowding to the cities in search of work never to be found.

BUYS LAND HERE.

Geo. R. Gray, a well to do wheat grower from North Dakota has purchased eighty acres of the Coos City tract of the C. A. Smith Timber Co.'s logged off lands. Mr. Gray and his assistant, P. R. Robin, will start at once to clear the land of stumps by means of a stump puller, which is operated by hand and only weighs 175 pounds. They intend to demonstrate what can be done with Coos county logged-off lands. After examining lands from Seattle to Coos Bay they pronounce these the cheapest and best.

TAKES TEMPORARY ACTION.

Short Court Session Held by Judge Coker—Temporary Injunction Dissolved.

In a short court session held this morning Judge Coker decided the case of T. H. Barry vs. the city in which the former contended that his property in North Marshfield does not border Eighth street and hence he could not be held liable for assessments on this street. The court dissolved the temporary injunction on motion of the city, holding that Eighth street is continued to the north boundary of the city. No showing was made by the defendant and that matter will come up for a hearing on its merits during the December term of the circuit court.
