And was voted, by Marshfield just grand.

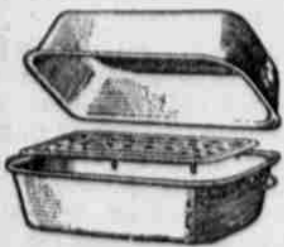
The dredgenaught P. Michie full manned

OREGON TIES AGGIES TODAY

8-yard line and Lutz made 5 yards when time was taken out because of Beckett's injury. From the 12-yard line Lutz failed at a field goal and Beckett punted 40 yards from Oregon's 20-yard line. Yeager made seven yards in two plunges and Lutz punted 50 yards. The end of the first half ended with the ball in the center of the field and the score 0 to 0.

Third Quarter—The first few minutes were a general see-sawing of the ball and with six minutes yet to play Lutz made a place kick from Oregon's 15-yard line for the first score of the game. Lutz was consistent in his punts of 50 yards. Three forward passes in the middle of this quarter, following in succession by Lutz, were unsuccessful and Oregon recovered the ball.

From the 37-yard line Bryant failed on a field goal from a difficult angle and the third quarter ended 3 to 0 and Oregon's ball on their 42-yard line.

Fourth Quarter—Beckett punted 45 yards to Yeager with a 7 yard return and Abraham went through center for 14 yards, the longest gain of the game and for the next few minutes the ball see-sawed to-

ward the middle of the field. Sharp made four yards on a quarterback run and Huntington fumbled. Weist recovered the ball and a forward pass from Sharp to Weist, ended Oregon 60 yards and here with the ball on O. A. C.'s 15-yard line Oregon lost four yards and on the fourth down Huntington dropped back and placed the ball squarely between the goal posts evening the score to a 3 to 3. Here the game ended a few minutes later. This is the second year in succession that Oregon and the Aggies have tied. Oregon has won 11 out of the 14 games played with O. A. C. and four have been ties.

The Times had the full account of the game play for play direct from the field three minutes after each play. Such speed was made through the kindness of Bert Cohen, brother of Frank Cohen, of Marshfield, who sat in the press box and sent his dispatches.

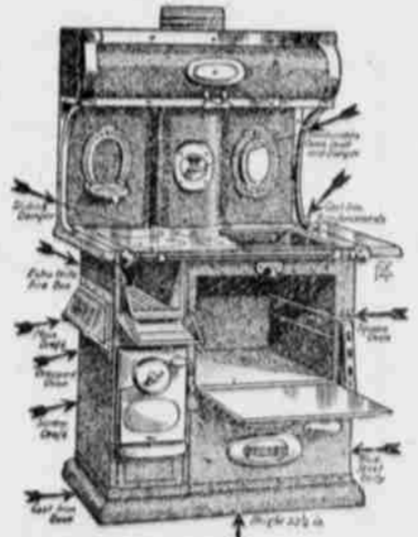
