Mr. Gage had to leave for Marshfield about ten minutes after she arrived to serve some papers in the McNabb lawsuit at North Bend and he was unable to return yesterday afternoon, missing the train.

To Lecture Monday.—Dr. J. T. Abbott, of Eugene, will give a public lecture on Monday evening at the Methodist Episcopal church at 8 o'clock on the subject: "Crater Lake Scenic Wonders of the World." Celebrated End of Season.—With the Tallant Salmon Cannery closed down yesterday, many of the Japanese and Chinese employees left today on the Breakwater for Astoria. Osh Kosh and Hashimura Toko both celebrated the end of the strenuous two months by an internal application of gin and two hours before sailing time they were "inside looking out" and

tranquil again. Osh Kosh peered through the bars and gritted his teeth with violence, varying the performance at times by rolling in his bunk. Both were given their freedom in time to catch the boat for Astoria.

No Early Train Sunday.—That there will be no 7 o'clock mail train for Myrtle Point out of here tomorrow morning is the word coming today from the office of the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern. Supt. W. F. Miller was out of town today in Myrtle Point and will return this evening. He has not yet been advised from the Portland office when to put the new schedule into effect. He had thought he would be able to start the early morning service tomorrow.

Is Building.—Capt. Johnson, who has been in charge of the Bandon Life Saving Station for sixteen years, and who has one of the best records for efficiency on the coast, was in Marshfield today on matters connected with a new concrete block he is building there. The structure will be one story at present, but is constructed so that a couple more stories may be added later if necessary. He came over last evening with Senators Lane and Chamberlain.

Mayor Finds Companion.—Riding his bicycle on Commercial avenue between Second and Broadway streets without a light last night, E. H. Joehnk was hailed by an officer, arrested and this morning appeared before Judge Butler and received a judgment of \$5 against him, which he paid. This now gives Mayor Allen a companion in misery. The Mayor committed a like offense several weeks ago.

Aviation Meet.—Light and fairy-like was J. Johnson on his feet last evening. He was in great spirits; the more he downed his spirits, the more his spirits rose. And at last he was soaring—oh, far above the sordid world, at least J. Johnson thought so in his mind. In reality he was sitting on Front street with his front feet hanging over and his airship and castles were rudely hauled from the heavens when J. Johnson was brought up suddenly all standing by a blue coated officer, who put him to bed a few minutes later. Range Lights Out.—Capt. W. A. Magee of the Nann Smith reports that part of the range lights in the lower Bay were out when he crossed in yesterday morning at 4 o'clock, making navigation extremely dangerous. He says that the light tender must be to blame now. Previously when protest was made about the lights not burning, it was claimed that the wind had blown them out. This time there was no wind, he says, and anyway they are the kind that cannot be blown out. He was also irate because the dredge Seattle had not cut away the shoal at the government works, the worst one in the Bay now, he says. He declared that he would bet a new hat that the Port Commission would use up all the funds or allow the Seattle to get away without dredging out the shoal, although it should not take more than a few days to do it.
