The Progress Club yesterday at their regular meeting launched a movement for aid for the suffering Belgians which should be given the hearty support of all citizens of Coos County. Plans were made for a general headquarters which will be under the supervision of the president of the club, Mrs. Ward M. Blake. All churches, clubs, lodges, and other organizations will be asked to assist in the collection of non-perishable food stuffs, clothing money and other needed commodities which will be forwarded at an early date to aid in the charitable work. A general working committee consisting of Mrs. W. S. Nicholson, Mrs. R. H. Corey, Mrs. Fred Powers and Mrs. P. W. Payne will have charge of the supplies received. A room has been secured on Broadway, between Central and Anderson avenue and commencing Friday and continuing to the next Wednesday, one member of the committee will be in attendance to receive any contributions. Those having things they wish to give and are not able to bring them to headquarters may notify Mrs. W. M. Blake, phone 212, and a messenger will call for the articles. The committee will attend to the packing of the articles for shipment.

Plans were also made to secure the co-operation of those in North Bend, Coquille, Bandon and Myrtle Point who might wish to aid and members of the Progress Club were assigned to communicate with each club in those towns asking for assistance in the work.

Partly worn clothing will probably be a big feature in the aid and all who can are asked to contribute a little at this season of Thanksgiving to aid the unfortunate people of Belgium who are without country, homes or means of subsistence.
