

FOOTBALL GAME HERE TOMORROW

High School Team and Old Guard To Play in Afternoon—Probable Lineups

If football is a part of the Thanksgiving menu, and there are many who maintain that it is, the supporters of the game should see their favorite dish served up in fine style tomorrow when the High School and 1911 teams clash. With prospects for an ideal day, enthusiasm is running high and the purple and gold will be very much in evidence.

Coach Niles, for three years all-star northwest fullback and one of the greatest kickers in the game, will play quarter for the high school. Under his leadership the boys hope for certain victory and will confidently expect to outwit and outplay their heavier opponents.

The 1911 boys, on the other hand, figure that in weight, speed and experience they are the superior team. They, also, expect to win with ease and have numerous supporters who are willing to back their opinions with good, hard cash. In 1909, '10 and '11, as the local high school team, they mowed down every school team in the county and were considered a wonderful eleven in inter-scholastic circles. With one or two exceptions it is this same team, which won three consecutive championships, that will face Coach Niles and his bunch of Hopefuls in tomorrow's contest.

The game will be called at 1:30, an hour earlier than the usual time, and will be played on the depot grounds.

Practically All Stores Closed for Day—Union Service and Football Game

Memories of the good old Pilgrim Fathers will practically disrupt business on the morrow. For seven days turkeys have been flooding into the market places from along the highways and byways, and for seven days the housewives have inspected the national birds to pick each their particular bird for the one big day of the year when gastronomic exercises are quite the thing.

For those who expect mail the Postmaster declares the general delivery window and the carriers' windows will be open between 1:30 and 2:30 p. m. There will be no collections or deliveries of mail through the day.

Everything in the way of eatables should be purchased before the grocery stores close this evening, as practically every one in the city has agreed that they will be closed all day tomorrow.

At the clothing and furnishings stores the proprietors state that they will lock their doors at noon, thus giving plenty of opportunity for people to buy clean collars and etcetera for that big holiday dinner.

The barber shops will be open until noon. The drug stores will close at 2 o'clock and the shoe stores will be shut up the entire day.

Mail will be carried out and the regular passenger service run on the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern, but no freight will be handled and the warehouse will be shut up for the day.

A special union Thanksgiving service will be held in the Episcopal church at 11 a. m. and practically all of the churches of the city will take part.

For those who love the national game preliminary or following the digest of the national bird, may enjoy the football game at the depot grounds at 1:30 p. m., when the high school team will meet the football team of 1912 in "mortal" combat.

TURKEY DEMAND DRAINS MARKET

Citizens Face Thanksgiving With Local Bird Supply Behind Demand

In five butcher shops of the city at about three o'clock this afternoon the telephone rang. In every case five butchers listened to five questions, all of them alike: "Have you got any turkeys left?" and five butchers looked mournfully on their cleaned out racks and sighed. The local market was completely void of unsold turkeys and dozens of well-meaning citizens are this very minute facing a Thanksgiving feast of hamburger steak and sausages.

That there were plenty of turkeys in Coos county to supply the local trade is the belief. Through some miscue the surplus and then some have been shipped to other climes. There are still plenty of chickens left in the market.

DOZEN CHILDREN ADDED TO ROLLS

School Census Shows Increase of 12 Over 1913—Total Pupils is 920.

There are twelve more school children in Marshfield this year than there were last year, according to the annual school census that was completed today at noon. The total number of children between the ages of four and twenty years is 920. This has not yet been tabulated in form as to the number of males and females.

In the 1913 census there were 905 pupils and of this number 478 were boys and 427 girls. Judge John Hall believes that about this same proportion will prevail again this year.

For each pupil the county court levies a sum of practically \$8 and to this is added the state appropriation, amounting to about \$1.75. For the 920 pupils of school district No. 9 about \$9000 will be collected this year.

The census was made by a house to house canvass of the entire city by Judge John Hall, J. Tom Hall and Ben Fisher and has taken the better share of a week to complete.

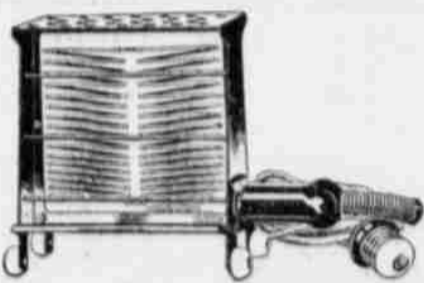
