GOES TO ARRANGE COUNTY EXHIBITS

J. A. Ward to Confer with Panama-Pacific Fair Officials—Left on Redondo

To secure definite knowledge of just how much space will be allotted the Coos and Curry Exhibit at A. Ward left yesterday afternoon on the Redondo for San Francisco. There he has a conference on Monday with George M. Hyland, managing secretary of the Oregon Commission.

Fresh from his trip through Curry county, Mr. Ward is now well acquainted with exactly what will be left from this section to the fair. Space was allotted in the Oregon building but a short time ago and it is to get the location of this space and to see in just what manner the exhibits should be arranged that Mr. Ward is now on his way to San Francisco.

By January 10 he will begin his first shipment of exhibits to the fair, and Mr. Ward yesterday began salting. Making his first big arrangement at that time, orders will be installed as rapidly as possible. Already in cold storage in San Francisco are boxes of magnificent apples sent south weeks ago on the Nann Smith.

In his office on Front street Mr. Ward has long been canning fruit, bottling the specimens in great jars of preservative. Vegetables have been placed in sand and shavings for safe keeping until next spring. The apples have been so arranged in boxes that through a system of labeling it will be possible to have Coos and Curry apples exhibited for months at the fair. Placed in boxes, one layer at a time will be exposed, the other layers awaiting in cold storage their turn to show visitors exactly what can be done here in the way of horticulture.

Mr. Ward expects to be gone but a few days, returning the latter part of next week to continue his collecting of specimens and exhibits. He was much pleased with the securing of the \$600 appropriation from the city to carry on the work and expressed his opinion that Curry county will make a proper contribution to the \$5000 fund of the two counties.
