New Auto Line.—Messrs. Adolphsen and Chamberlain have started the Marshfield-Ferdale auto line. The cars will leave the Lloyd Hotel in Marshfield at fifteen minutes before each hour and Ferdale on each hour making hourly trips from 7:45 a. m. until 10 p. m.

Had Operation.—W. S. Chandler and wife have gone to Vancouver, B. C., to visit their daughter, Mrs. Harry Tremaine, who underwent an operation for appendicitis a few days ago. Mrs. Chandler reached there prior to the operation and wired that it had been very successful.

Hears Divorce Case.—Before Judge Coke this morning was threshed out the divorce case in which Ohma McGinnis seeks a legal separation from her husband, Thomas McGinnis. This is a case that has appeared several times before. No decision has been rendered.

Bad Slide.—Some bad slides are reported on the Smith-Powers line beyond Myrtle Point and parties in from Coaledo yesterday stated that this might result in delaying the moving of the Coaledo camps for a few months. Two steamshovels are working in it.

Calls Officer.—A policeman was called Wednesday and again yesterday to quell a domestic trouble that is claimed to be a long standing dispute between husband and wife. It is stated that Mrs. Lapp expects to leave for the home of her mother in Bellingham. No arrests were made.

Would Cancel Mortgage.—P. A. McNabb who some time ago bought the Hotel Esther of North Bend from Mrs. Belle Spong and T. S. Boggs now seeks to cancel a mort-

gage which he gave to each of the parties for two 40-acre tracts of land on the grounds that the business of the hotel was misrepresented to him and is not a paying proposition.

Political Expense.—It cost Asmus Adolphsen of Denmark \$67 to make his unsuccessful campaign against S. P. Peirce for joint representative from Coos and Curry counties, according to the statement that Mr. Adolphsen has just filed with the secretary of state. Seeks Damages.—Suit has been brought in the justice court of Judge Stanley of Coquille by Mrs. Siverene Foote and her husband, W. R. Foote as two separate actions of law, each involving 250 damages and against Peter Thurston who but a short time ago bought the Foote ranch and it is alleged by the plaintiffs refused to allow them to take personal property and belongings from their home. Attorneys Graves and Melatuff have been retained by the plaintiffs.

Reichers, who has represented Marshall-Wells Hardware Company in this section for the past few years, has resigned and will leave about the middle of December for Kansas where he will take charge of a big retail hardware business of his father. MAIL TO COME BY WAY OF MAPLETON

Post Office Department Authorizes Change From Myrtle Point Route

Coos Bay mail via the Mapleton route became a certainty when yesterday afternoon Judge John Hall received word from the Post Office Department that such a change has been authorized and will be put into operation at once when the mail service to Mapleton and Florence is transferred to the Willamette Pacific route.

When this will be a still a matter of supposition but with the line completed and opened into Mapleton since November 1 and the knowledge that a government mail contract can be countermanded on the giving of between 30 to 60 days' notice to the contractors the general belief here is that the Christmas mail will be brought in from up the beach.

That he can be ready on a day's notice to take care of a mail contract down the beach is the declaration of Jerry Kinney of the Gorst and Kinney Auto Stage Company. When the matter was first broached to him three weeks ago Mr. Kinney then stated that his company stands ready any time to put up a bond for the delivering of the mail here on time.

Some days of the month it will be possible to have mail on Coos Bay the same day that it leaves Portland. This would be possible when the mail catches the midnight train from the Rose City reaching Eugene at 6:30 a. m. and leaving on the Willamette Pacific to Mapleton at 8:30 where it would arrive shortly before noon, ready to be transferred down the river by boat.

Between Florence and Gardiner the Bangs Livery Company of Eugene have two six-horse stages that connect with the Gorst and King line at Winchester Bay.

The trip could be made clear through from Mapleton to Coos Bay on days when the tide is running right. At other times the mail would be delayed for about 12 hours, yet even at the longest time it is pointed out that a saving of between 12 and 20 hours would be made over the present Myrtle Point route.

When this change is made and the second assistant postmaster general has this jurisdiction and has promised it, only the Coos Bay mail will be affected while the Coquille Valley points will continue to get their letters over the road from Roseburg.
