BROTHER MAY BE SENT TO SENATE

I. N. Miller receives word his brother, former Seattle Mayor, may receive Post. That his brother, John F. Miller, is being prominently mentioned in the Spokane and Puget Sound papers as a likely candidate for the next United States Senator from Washington to succeed Senator Poindexter, is the encouraging word just received here by Attorney I. N. Miller.

In 1908-09 John F. Miller was mayor of Seattle. Several years ago an uncle bearing the same name was elected to the Senate from California. Mr. Miller, of Seattle, is a prominent attorney there and a great friend of ex-Senator Piles, who preceded Poindexter in the Senate.

Both Miller and Piles came to Puget Sound on the same train from the east in 1882. At that time J. F. Miller took up a job washing bungalows in a Seattle livery stable and Piles, the future United States Senator, went into a logging camp to run a donkey engine. Later these two men became roommates and great friends. Both are Republicans. Poindexter is a Progressive and with the slump of Roosevelt's party it is prophesied that the next Senator from Washington will be a Republican.

WORKING ON PLANS

Architect Tourtelot of the new Simpson Hotel at North Bend is now working on revised plans and estimates and will probably have them ready tomorrow. Secretary Smith of the North Bend Chamber of Commerce will probably call a meeting of the stockholders then to consider erecting the smaller hotel building now and later adding an annex.
