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OPPOSE JOHNSON ON APPOINTMENTS

Members of Coos County Republican Central Committee Adopt Resolutions Here

That the protest registered by the executive committee of the Republican Central Committee of the county at its meeting Saturday afternoon against the reported action of Sheriff-elect Johnson in selecting his two deputies from Coquille was not at the solicitation of any possible candidate is the statement today of C. A. Sehbredre, a member of the committee.

A resolution was passed by the body, declaring that it was the majority on Coos Bay that elected Sheriff-elect Johnson and that therefore a portion of the patronage should be distributed to men from the Coos Bay section. The resolution will be forwarded to Mr. Johnson who was not present at the meeting.

The two deputy positions pay annual stipends of \$1200 and \$1000 respectively. At the Republican rally held here previous to the election, Mr. Johnson says C. A. Sehbredre, took a decided stand in declaring that if elected, he would not make his office a "family affair." It was reported at the meeting that already he had appointed his brother-in-law W. C. Laird as a deputy. L. W. Oddy, a present deputy, also has received an appointment.

Few at Meeting. Those who were present at the executive committee meeting on Saturday afternoon were Chairman P. M. Hall-Lewis, A. H. Derbyshire, C. A. Sehbredre, Fred Gettins and D. L. Buckingham.

The following is the resolution they passed: "Whereas, it appears from the official returns of the recent election, that the Coos Bay precincts of Coos County gave to Mr. Alf Johnson, Jr., Republican candidate for Sheriff of Coos County, a sufficient plurality to overcome the plurality obtained by his chief opponent on the other side of the county, and

"Whereas, Mr. Alf Johnson, Jr. therefore owes his election to the office of county Sheriff, to the support received from the Coos Bay precincts and in fulfillment of his pledge to the people to treat all sections of the county with equal fairness, is in honor bound to give the Coos Bay side of the county an equal share of his official patronage, now therefore be it

"Resolved, that it is the sense of the Republican County Central Committee, that Mr. Alf Johnson's attention be called to the above recited facts, and that he be requested to accord to the Coos Bay side of Coos County, an equal share of the appointments of deputies to serve under him as Sheriff of Coos County, and
