Go Visiting—Mr. and Mrs. Frank D. Cohan and A. J. Mendel went to Lakeside Sunday on an over Sunday trip.

Plan Dance.—The Smith mill boys are planning to give a benefit dance January 9. The place and plans have not been completed yet.

Deal Not Closed.—The Marshfield Elks deal for the purchase of a lot 25x100 from Levi Helsen on Third property for \$3000 will be finally closed on the return of Mrs. Helsen from California next week.

War Prices on Drinks.—It is stated that the Marshfield Saloons are figuring on raising the price of liquid refreshments as a result of the war tax and other reasons. Beer under the rumored schedule is to be ten cents per, and other liquors fifteen cents.

Four Concrete.—Concrete in the main pier of the Willamette Pacific bridge above North Bend has commenced and men are now putting in concrete at the rate of about 100 yards a day. It is expected that it will take at least a month to complete this caisson.

Booklet a Crab.—In the shape of a large crab is a "many" booklet received at the Chamber of Commerce from the Sunset Magazine people, who submit this as a design for a small booklet containing pictures of Coos Bay. It will be turned over to the advertising committee.

To Ship Boat South.—Lew Gillis, who last year married the Princess Wab-ta-Waso, has written asking that his gasoline pleasure boat that he used here last summer be shipped to him in San Diego. The boat will be brought down and soon fixed for shipping by steamship.

No Decision Yet.—One of the candidates for the appointment of postmaster in Marshfield has received a letter from Senator Chamberlain, written December 5, in which he says that the Marshfield postmastership

has not been decided either by him or Senator Lane. He says that none of the appointments have been decided upon yet.

**Would Install Concrete Plant.**—Inquiries regarding the prospects of installing a concrete products plant on Coos Bay have been received in a letter to the Chamber of Commerce from F. J. Pfeiffer of the Salem Sewer Pipe Company. The writer declares that he is at present installing a large concrete mixing machine at Salem and may come here later to investigate this location.

**Epworth League Banquet.**—A banquet to the Epworth League was served Friday evening in the church parlors by the Ladies Aid Society. There were about 40 present at the three-course banquet. About five months ago the men of the league tendered a banquet to the women and then in turn retaliated and this being declared the best still, a third celebration was in order.

**Had Narrow Escape.**—Jack Seabrook, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Seabrook, former residents of Marshfield had a narrow escape from burning to death in a fire which occurred at the Christmas festival of the Irvington school in Portland last week. Several children who wore cotton trimmings on their costumes were burned very severely. The fire was caused by defective wiring on an electrically lighted Christmas tree.

**Committee Organizes.**—The lodge and club room committee of the Marshfield Elks organized yesterday with Dorsey Kreitzer as chairman and George Goodrum as secretary. It will be their duty to equip and arrange the new club rooms in the new Noble building. The other members of the committee are W. S. Turpen, W. G. Chandler, J. W. Hildenbrand, Thomas Harvey and C. K. Perry.

**Library Opens.**—At 10 o'clock this morning the new \$12,000 public library at the corner of Market and Fifth streets was opened for the first time. All day Saturday and Sunday the moving of the books went on and by last evening all had been placed on the shelves in their new home. The new telephone number of the library is 146-L. The hours will be from 10 a. m. to 12 m. and from 2 p. m. to 6 p. m., opening in the evening from 7 p. m. until 9 p. m.

**They Took Overdoses.**—An overdose of "snake bite" on Saturday evening made J. Hinkley perform in a most ungentlemanly and un-ladylike manner; he became unsteady on his feet and it was necessary to give him a berth in the city jail away from the cold and temptation. Jim Gayle must have found the bottle that Hinkley threw away for he too appeared in the same condition a short time afterward, manipulating in a similar manner and together with John Keller and Sam Hastings the men found that "all roads lead to Rome" and became the guests of the city Saturday evening. F. W. McFarland and Charles Carlson were evidently greatly provoked at each

other. They used their fists in strenuous efforts to knock off each others' "beans" but were detected and jailed in the middle of the procedure. All of the men either paid \$5 or secured an assessment to that extent.

**Appointed Attorney.**—J. T. Brand was appointed by Judge Coka on Saturday to defend James O'Brien, who is charged with the robbery of the Bohemian Saloon several weeks ago. The defendant had no money and it was for this reason that the court appointed a legal defender. It was claimed that O'Brien broke into the rear of the saloon after closing time and then in the guise of a "swamper" rifled the cash drawer of \$87. When caught by the police a few minutes later up on Broadway Street O'Brien had an envelope of due bills taken from the cash drawer. He pleaded not guilty in Justice Court.

**\$5 for Open Muffler.**—Another victim of the campaign opened by the police for the enforcement of the traffic ordinances was added to the list when Lynn Lambeth appeared in the police court this morning and pleaded guilty to having his muffler open Saturday night on Front street. He paid a fine of \$5. Lambeth was also arrested by Chief Jack Carter on the charge of speeding. Lambeth denied the charge very vehemently, declaring that he had his eye on the speedometer and traveled at no time more than 15 miles an hour. Chief Carter declared that he was traveling more than 30 miles an hour, but he had no stop watch to substantiate his accusation.

**To Save Property.**—Gordon Smith, engineer of the Marshfield fire department, says that the reason the new fire engine was attached to the mains at the Coos Bay bakery fire the other night was because the fire was small and that he was sure fresh water could handle it. He says that the salt water causes much more damage than the fresh water and when he sized up the blaze he knew that the fresh water would be ample. He had three streams pumping with 180 pounds pressure, one of them through an inch and one-half nozzle and it quickly extinguished the blaze. His idea was to keep the loss from water to a minimum. He says that in a bad fire one stream of salt water is equal to three of fresh water.

**Want Postoffice.**—Residents of North Inlet are preparing a petition to United States Senator George E. Chamberlain asking that a postoffice be established there to be known as "Inlet, Oregon." The mail facilities there are poor and the eight miles separating them from the North Bend postoffice and the seven and one-half miles from Lakeside postoffice does not indicate the difficulties in securing service. Davis Howard, who conducts a store on North Inlet, which is centrally located, is an applicant for postmaster in case the new office is granted. It is believed that the office will be established as soon as the investigation is made as the rapidly increasing population there is deserving of better mail facilities.
