PROGRESS CLUB'S AID FOR BELGIANS

Makes Statement of Goods Forwarded for Relief of Stricken Nation

The Progress Club wishes to express appreciation for the hearty co-operation by the people of Marshfield, North Bend, Eastside and Coos River in the work of aiding the European war sufferers, which work was recently undertaken under the supervision of this club. Large quantities of food, warm clothing and of groceries were contributed, a list of which appears below.

These goods were shipped via the Breakwater to Mr. C. Henri Labbe, the vice-consul of Belgium and the consul of France at Portland, Oregon. This was in accordance with instructions from the Belgian minister at Washington.

It is supposed the Coos Bay shipment will be included in the shipment of relief supplies raised in the states of Oregon and Washington. Beside two large packing boxes of children's clothing which were not itemized, the following is a list of the principal articles contributed and sent:

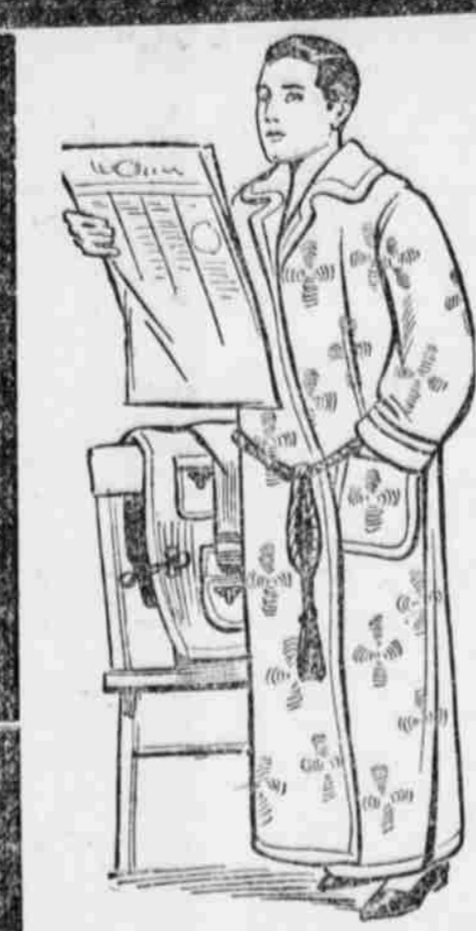

There were 13 cases set for trial in the circuit court yesterday by Judge Coke, the Bandon liquor cases being the first on the docket, coming up before the jury on Monday morning.
