## LOCAL BREVITIES

**Fire at Bandon.**—Parties from Coquille today reported that two houses near the Bandon school house were destroyed by fire Wednesday night. They were owned by Mrs. Hartman.

**Home From School.**—Miss Gretchen Sherwood, daughter of A. J. Sherwood, of Coquille, has returned from the University of Oregon for her Christmas vacation and last evening came over on a visit with her friend, Miss Leta Maat. The University was closed early this year on account of a near epidemic of mumps.

**Put on Roof.**—Workmen began yesterday putting on the roof of the new high school gymnasium, having practically finished the outside walls. With the completion of the roof the contractors will then be able to proceed with the concrete swimming pools in the basement. They have waited for the roof that the work below might be protected from the weather.

**Speeded Motorcycle.**—Wolfram Schmieding was arrested yesterday by Gordon Smith for speeding his motorcycle at the rate of 30 miles an hour. Police Judge Butler handed down a \$10 fine and suspended sentence on good behavior. Schmieding declared that this was his first time on a new machine and that he was not able to regulate its speed.

**Close Camp.**—With their grading with the large steam shovel complete, Camp 3 of the Hauser & Hauser company has been closed down and the crew paid off. There now remains only work for the scrappers and it is probable that this will not be done at the present. Camp 3 is about five miles this way from Lakeside. A crew is still at work on the grading at Camp 4.

**Funeral Held.**—The funeral of John Golden was held this morning from the Wilson Undertaking Parlor, the services being conducted by the Rev. Father McDevitt. Mrs. Kennedy of Bandon, a sister, with her husband and daughter, were the only relatives of the old man present. The will is not to be opened until after its arrival from Portland, which may be several days yet.

**Raises Rice.**—J. A. Yoakum, Jr., brother of Mrs. Wm. Horsfall and who born and raised here, has returned from Gridley, California for a visit. He is a rice farmer in the California Valley and is doing very well. This year he had in between 300 and 400 acres of rice. Matt Nelstrom, formerly of Myrtle Point, is also near the same place and this year harvested a crop off of 60 acres that netted him \$5,000.

**Drive Piling.**—Chas. Noble is today taking his pile driver to the lot west of the Lemanski theater on Central avenue, where he will drive the piling for the new Noble concrete building for Perry-Nicholson and the Eiks' lodge. The house is being moved from the site to Fourth near Central and L. T. Matthews and family are making their home with their daughter, Mrs. Jerry Kinney, in the meantime.

**Much Parcels Post.**—The outgoing parcel post on the Elder yesterday morning was 85 sacks and 11 parcels totalling 3342 pounds and taking three trips of a wagon to haul it to the dock. The Breakwater will take the balance of the Christmas mail on Saturday. As there is no steamer to Portland then until December 24, Postmaster Curtis emphasizes the fact that all parcels should be in the post office by 10 a. m. Saturday.

**Vacation Commences.**—This afternoon the last classes in the schools of the city were held and the students then turned loose for their two weeks' vacation, until January 4, 1915, when they must

report back again for the work before them until late in May. Some of the teachers are planning on leaving the city on their vacations, a part of them going home. There are several that will leave on the Breakwater in the morning for Portland.

**Students May Come Early.**—Because of the prevalence of mumps at the University of Oregon which for a time threatened to develop into an epidemic, the institution has been closed down until January 4 and this being the case the students from Coos Bay who have been attending the university are expected to arrive home several days earlier for their Christmas vacation. In past years some of the students have failed to come home for the holidays because of the time necessary in coming and going. The vacation will give them several extra days.

**Made Fast Time.**—According to word from Portland the Breakwater arrived in there last Sunday morning at 7:30 in the morning. Captain Maegenn declares this is the earliest that he has arrived in the northern port for five years and the earliest time was once when he arrived in a 7 a. m. Unusually good weather prevailing along the coast during the past ten days has made speedy trips possible. The George W. Elder arrived in here from Portland on her last trip in a trifle less than 22 hours a feat that Captain Lofsted declares he can duplicate again next week if the weather permits.

**Given \$100 Sentence.**—Joseph Schott appeared in the Circuit Court yesterday afternoon to answer to an indictment charging him with giving liquor to minors and pleading guilty, was given a fine of \$100 and a 90-days' sentence in jail, the latter being suspended on payment of the fine. Schott was subpoenaed before the grand jury a year ago but was not indicted at that time because of insufficient evidence. Schott alleged that he was in some club rooms and that the beer was standing on the table when some young fellows came in and helped themselves in his presence.
