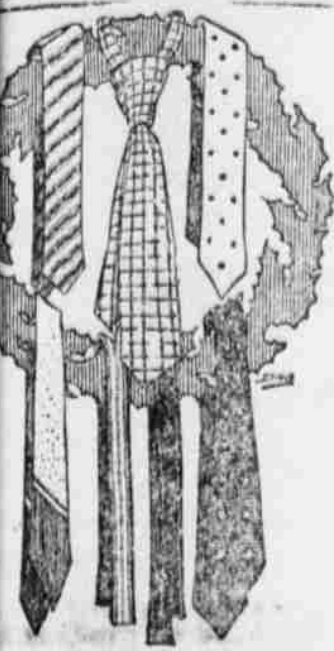

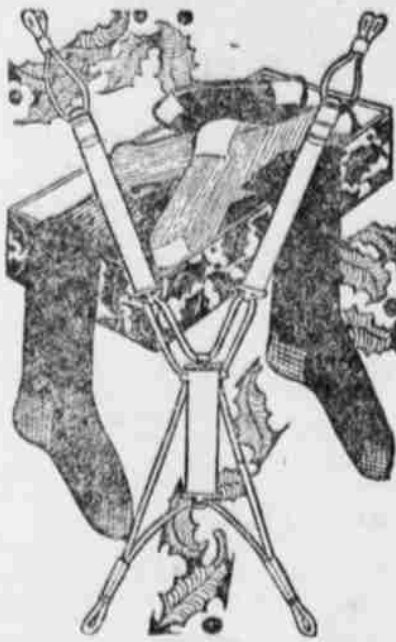

**Camp Did Not Burn.**—There was a rumor afloat on the streets today that one of the Hauser & Hauser camps near Lakeside on the Willamette Pacific burned down last evening. This report is incorrect and on a long distance call this afternoon the men at the camps declared there was nothing to the report.

**Theater Sold.**—The Orpheum Theater was sold this afternoon at a sale on a chattel mortgage given to secure the payment of claims against the theater. The only bidder was J. H. Bridges, who bid it in through his attorney, Tom Bennett. The claim was more than \$400. The Orpheum Theater was run by Charles and Luverne Tower.

**Sheriff Has Prisoner.**—Sheriff W. W. Gage came in her late last evening and left on the early morning train, having in custody Orlando Smith, the old man who has been arrested for heinous crimes that he confessed in Prosper when he "got religion." Smith is a fine looking old man, appearing to be more than 70 years of age.

**Makes Expenses.**—The Art Exhibit and sale of the grade pupils closed last evening at the Owl Drug Store and after counting up the proceeds of the two days' sale it was found that the pupils had made their expenses and had come out with a small profit. **Revising Charter.**—The charter revision committee of Eastside has met January 3, 1916, as the date of their next meeting. It is expected there will need to be several meetings before the new charter is properly revised and ready for the vote of the people. At the same time new name, it is expected, will be chosen for combined Eastside and Cooscon. George Watkins is aiding in drawing up the charter, appearing as the city attorney for Eastside.

**Called Off Games.**—When the Multnomah Athletic Club of Portland called off their games a few days ago for a football game with the University of Colorado team and another on Christmas Day with the University of Idaho, the chances for Royal Niles, of the Marshfield High School, to go to Portland, dwindled in the dust. Mr. Niles, who for three years was an All-Northwest fullback at Whitman College, had been signed up by the Club to play with them in the games.

**Limits Work.**—Attorney General Crawford has issued a decree to the Industrial Welfare Commission in Portland, telling the members that he will prosecute any violations of the female workers' law, which limits

the hours of any woman in a mercantile establishment to eight hours and 20 minutes a day. Also he declares that it will be unlawful to work such women after six o'clock in the evening, all of which is expected to either change the trend of Christmas shopping or to cause the big stores to put on an extra force of employees.

**Leaves Today; Goes To Morrow.**—L. J. Simpson, president of the Port of Coos Bay, left today on the Breakwater for Portland, where he goes to confer with Major Morrow, the Government engineer, relative to the jetty work and the appropriations for the jetty work of Coos Bay. 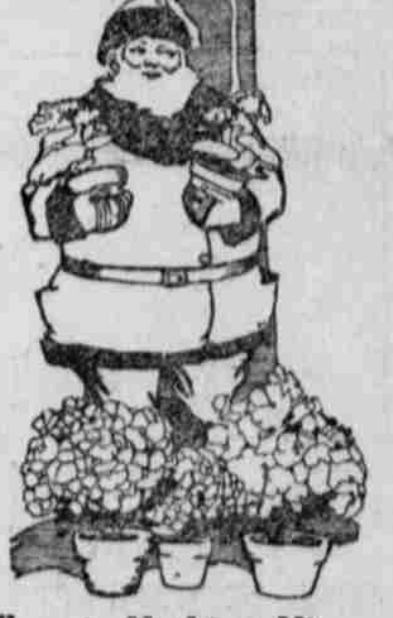
