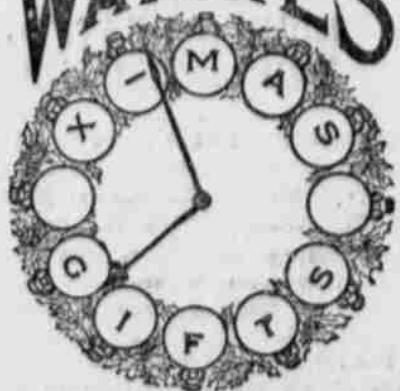

Dredge Holiday.—Manager R. E. Miller, of the dredge Seattle stated today that the dredge would close down twenty-four hours for a Christmas holiday for the employees. He has not determined yet whether they will close down Thursday evening or Friday morning.
