## CHILDREN HIS ONLY VALUABLES

George Ross, of Ferndale, Puts Up Novel Contention in Justice Court

"I haven't any money, Judge, and the only thing that I have of value that he could take is the children."

This was the statement of George Ross, who lives in a tent at Ferndale, to Justice Penneck yesterday when he presented himself in court to answer a suit brought by E. H. Joehnk for \$207.45. It seems that Ross had sent his three children, Gladys, Charles and Gerald to the Gravel Ford Academy, agreeing to pay \$247.45 to the board and education. He paid \$40, but he has not paid any of the balance since last summer and W. H. Bunch, trustee of the school, sent the bill to E. H. Joehnk to collect.

Ross says that he has had a lot of hard luck. When they sent the children to school his wife went to work in a hotel and he went to work in a logging camp, figuring that they could make enough to pay the way of the young folks. However sickness interfered and then they lost their work and now he is out of funds and out of a job.

Justice Penneck said that he guessed that all Ross could do under the circumstances would be to let Joehnk have a judgment for the \$207.45 and pay it when he could.
