Annual Installation.—The annual banquet and installation of officers in the local chapter of the Eagles' Lodge will be held this evening in the Eagles' Hall. Plans have long been under way to make this affair the climax of a prosperous year in the order and the opening of a new term. New Meat Market.—A. H. Pense, who has been identified with the Gourley & Jones Meat Market at Myrtle Point the past 18 months, has leased the room in the Rogers building on Market avenue, formerly occupied by the O. K. Chop House, and will open a meat market there soon. Mr. Pense comes highly recommended and has had many years experience in the meat business. He was engaged in it in Washington before coming to Bay City a few years ago. He plans to run a strictly c. s. h. market.

Had Narrow Escape.—Miss Selma Stonelake had a narrow escape from marrying the wrong man when she appeared in the justice court this morning with the name of Oscar Mattson, a witness, written in on the license in the place where the name of William E. Hakala, the prospective groom, should have appeared. The eagle eye of the justice detected the error, the license was reconstructed and the couple will be married here this evening. Both gave their age as 22 years and Marshfield their place of residence.

Farmers Read Pamphlets.—That the farmers of Coos Bay who ride on passenger boats in whose cabins are racks of agricultural and stock literature placed there by the County Agriculturist make good use of this reading matter is the declaration of the boatmen of the Bay. In the meantime the secretary continues to "paw the air" and figure extensively.
