**ONLY CANDLES AT THE MASS.**  
By Order of Late Pope Pius Electric Lights Were Barred.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 8.—The little electric lights that twinkled among the altar decorations in Roman Catholic churches in former Christmas masses were missing this year. Even in the cathedral, where the bishops were the celebrants, only the wax tapers lighted the altars.

The electric lights were banished by one of the last edicts of Pope Pius. He held that while their use was proper for lighting the church, it was not proper to use them on the altars. "The use of the lights has been quite common, especially at the feast days," said the Rev. John Ward, bishop of the Leavenworth diocese. "While the edict prohibits the placing of electric or gas lights on the main or side altars, it does not affect the use of either electricity or gas for lighting the building or chancel. The order merely insists that the church custom of using only tapers for the altar lights be adhered to more strictly."
