Home Mortgage Co., a corporation, Plaintiff, vs. Eugene Arthur Hermida, Defendant.

To Eugene Arthur Hermida: You are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint now on file against you in the above entitled court in the above entitled suit, in which the Home Mortgage Co. is plaintiff and you are defendant, on or before the 23rd day of January, 1915, the same being the last day for answering prescribed in the order of publication of this summons; and if you fail to appear or answer on or before said date the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded in his complaint, a succinct statement of which is as follows, to-wit:
