WAR DICTIONARY

LANDWEHR—The second line of the German army into which every able-bodied German passes after his seven year service in the active army, which begins at twenty. The second "line" includes all men between the ages of 30 and 35, trained or untrained. After his two years of compulsory service in the active army, the German soldier is called out for a term of active reserve service with the Landwehr during the first two years while he is in the first "line" of the Landwehr. He is then transferred to the second "line" of the Landwehr for a term of reserve service.
