FUNERAL OF MRS. ROBINSON

Hattie E. Robinson was born at New London, Iowa, Feb. 29 1867, and died in Mercy Hospital, North Bend, Ore., Jan. 12 1915, aged 47 years, 11 months and 22 days.

TO OPEN STORE IN MARSHFIELD

J. C. Penney and Company Will Put in Branch Next to Post-office—Rapid Growth

J. C. Penney & Co., which operates a line of eighty-three stores in thirteen states, has closed negotiations with R. F. Williams for a lease of a store room in the Williams building, next to the postoffice on South Broadway. They expect to open a store here about April 1.

The company's stores are generally known as the "Golden Rule" stores. They have stores in Pendleton, Albany and Roseburg in this section. Owing to R. A. Copple having the name "Golden Rule" here, it is expected that they will have a different title for the one here.

The company deals in general merchandise, clothing, dry goods, etc.

The deal here was closed through Alva Doll, Mr. McDonald, their northwest manager, was here to arrange for it. They expect to have two hundred stores soon.

Frank Whitman of Roseburg will be manager of the Marshfield store.

Mr. Penney, head of the company, is an old friend of Mr. Doll. The two went to school together in Hamilton, Mo., when boys. His rise has been rapid. He started in clerking in a store at \$25 a month. He started the first Golden Rule store about fifteen years ago and in the time since he has amassed a fortune of a million or more in addition to building up the immense business with head offices in New York and Salt Lake.

REMARRIES WIFE IN COUNTY JAIL

Robert Miller, Accused in California, Remarries His Second Wife.

Robert Lee Miller, engineer of 101 on the Smith-Powers Logging road, now in the county jail on a bench warrant from California charging him with failure to provide for two minor children, added another chapter to his already complicated domestic troubles, when he remarried his second wife in the parlors of Turnkey Landrith.

This morning C. A. Reynolds, Deputy Sheriff from Sonoma County, California, arrived with extradition papers to take Miller back with him. It is there the first Mrs. Miller has charged her former husband with a felony on the grounds that when they separated the court decreed that he should pay monthly \$20 in support of the two children. This, she alleges, has not been done.

When his divorce was secured Miller was commanded not to marry again within a period of six months. He disobeyed the court's orders by going up to Aberdeen, Washington, and there three months later marrying Sarah Anna Harrell, his present wife.

The couple moved to Coos Bay and set up housekeeping at Millington, where they have lived until the husband was apprehended at the Marshfield depot by Deputy Sheriff Laird about ten days ago.

It was when the wife found out that Miller had married her, contrary to the court's instructions, that she asked to be remarried, Justice Stanley performing the ceremony.

Much sympathy has been expressed for Miller and the trainmen on the line have promised him their financial aid. Today the question of allowing Miller to put up bonds for the payment of approximately \$300 past due on the \$20 monthly stipend and thus escape going to California was taken up through the Attorney in the South. Providing he is willing it is doubtful that the accused will be taken to California.

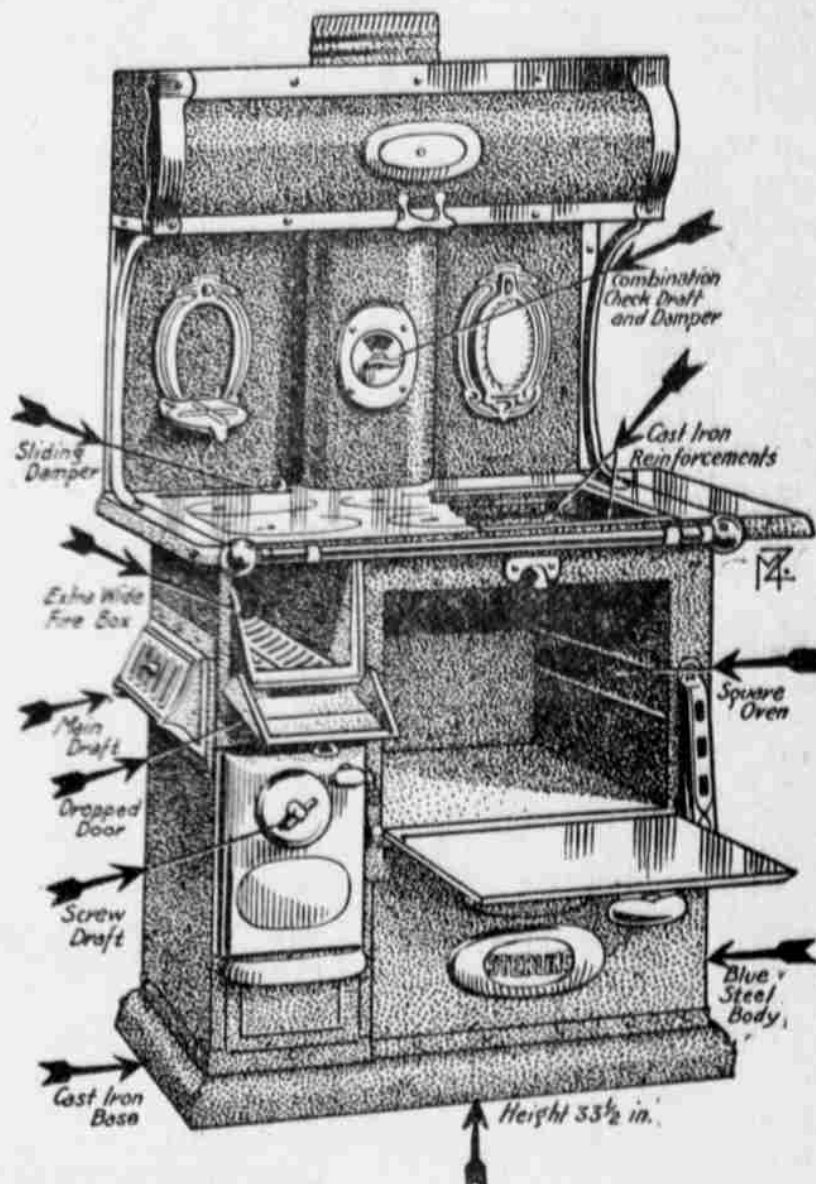
