**Quick Results.**—Dr. Lealie had a furnished flat for rent and ordered a want ad inserted in The Times three times. It ran Saturday and this morning he ordered the ad stopped, having already rented it.

**Ducks Grow Bold.**—Dal Catchcart reports that the ducks apparently know all about the game law. Saturday quite a flock of wild ducks spent the entire day in the pond in Perasm Park near his place.

**Returns to Marshfield.**—Verlin Parker, a young business man of Marshfield, left for there this morning by way of Portland. He had been visiting his father, E. R. Parker, on Eleventh avenue west—Eugene Guard.

**Called to Portland.**—J. N. Ryan, foreman of The Times composing room, left yesterday on the stage for Portland, where he was called by the death of his mother Saturday afternoon. He expects to be gone several days.

**May Return to California.**—W. K. Wiseman, who with his wife and daughter returned but a few days ago from California, stated today that he would probably return there later on. While in California the family traveled more than 8000 miles in their machine.

**Many Want Ranch.**—That there is a big demand for ranches is shown by the fact that Mr. Erickson, of Eastside, advertised a ranch for rent last week. The little want ad in The Times brought about a dozen applicants, responses being made in person, by phone and by mail.

**Send Data to Portland.**—In answer to an urgent request from the Portland Chamber of Commerce, Secretary Motley this morning sent north a list of Coos Bay factories and the articles made in each one. The Portland body expects to use the material in a publication to be issued soon.

**Blocks Save Tires.**—Blocks placed under the axles of the auto fire truck will amount to the saving of tire bills, according to Mark Savage, fire engine expert, and as a result, the local engine is today propped fore and aft on stiffs, thus relieving the tires of a continual weight.

**To Open Restaurant.**—F. C. Tucker of North Bend has purchased the restaurant and fixtures which belonged formerly to the Grand Cafe, of which Gust Demos and Tom Morris were proprietors. They went into bankruptcy, F. K. Gettins being appointed trustee and W. A. Ackerman attorney for the trustee in the case.

**For Liquor Sales.**—Petitions are being circulated here asking the Oregon Legislature to permit hotels having fifty or more guest rooms, to serve liquor to their guests. The Oregon Wholesale Liquor men are behind the bill and the Oregon Hotel Men's Association at Portland last week adopted it, copying closely after the Canadian law.

**Await Outcome.**—One Saturday morning both the Breakwater and the Elder left here at approximately the same time and the report of which one of them was first to arrive in Portland is awaited with interest here. The Elder is due to arrive back here tomorrow morning, leaving Portland this morning

a day behind her schedule, because of her delay at the Eureka bar.

**Dies in Portland.**—According to a report received here, P. C. Heald, who spent some time on Coos Bay in connection with timber deals and a Southern Oregon claim a few years ago, died in Portland recently. Heald was formerly prominent in Michigan timber and lumber circles and was also in politics there for a time. His son accompanied him here, but his operations were not extensive.

**Gathers Tonnage Report.**—H. C. Diers expects soon to finish his report on the amount of tonnage coming in and crossing out of Coos Bay during 1914. According to his statement today the list of imports will exceed the exports this year, this being due mainly to the railroad shipments that have come in here. The lumber exports will fall slightly below those of 1913, says Mr. Diers, but on the whole Coos Bay will about hold her own with previous records.

**Seeks Son.**—Marshal Carter is in receipt of a letter from Mrs. E. J. Williams of Grants Pass, asking him to try and locate her son, Tom Williams. She says that when she last heard from her son he was employed in the Coos tie camps a few miles from Bandon. That was in February, 1914. Since then she has not heard from him and a letter from Mr. Coats said that Williams had suddenly turned up missing, leaving his tools at the camp.

**To Fill Engineer's Berth.**—The city fathers this evening will undoubtedly be called upon to definitely decide a ticklish question that has kept them side-stepping for the past two weeks—that of filling the city engineer's berth. There are two candidates before the body, A. B. Gidley and F. A. Haines, both of them men of wide experience. At the meeting of the council last Monday evening Mayor Allen was unable to bring the councilmen to an agreement, part of them declaring their wish to choose an engineer at once and the remainder expressing their doubt.

**Charged With Theft.**—Otto Morrissey was arrested this morning by Constable Cox on a warrant sworn out by Mrs. Lola Baldwin, who conducts a rooming house on Broadway South which charges that Morrissey brought some pennants, a piano cover and Indian blankets to her house last June, saying they belonged to him, and subsequently borrowed \$20. Later Harry McKeown of the Chandler Hotel appeared and claimed the articles, saying they had been taken from Jesse Terrell at the hotel. Morrissey appeared and asked that the case be continued. He did not enter a plea before Justice Pennock.

**Opening Drain Box.**—Engineer Robert Kellogg, with a force of three or four men, is busy these nights during the low tides, seeking to open the drain box through Mill Slough. Having worked for a week now, the box has been cleared out up above Second street and Mr. Kellogg is satisfied that the procedure will be a success. With long ropes to which are tied dozens of horseshoes well filled with long nails the mud is cut away from the sides of the box, the rope being hauled back and forth. Through a portion of the box the water now bubbles merrily and at no place have the men found the drain caved in.

**Friends Play Joke.**—Saturday evening "Billy" Goodrum acted as financial secretary at the dance held in the Finnish Hall. Handfuls of dollars and half dollars were handed to him at the door until, laden down with the silver, he placed a few heaps of it in his overcoat pocket, along with his watch. He thought nothing more of it until he started to go home, when he found the money and valuables were gone. Search revealed nothing. Yesterday the watch came back neatly wrapped up and "Billy" began to smile as it dawned on him that his friends were playing a prank—at least he will altogether concede that it is a prank providing the money is forthcoming.

**S. P. Has New Booklet.**—A new booklet, just issued and about the size of the Coos Bay booklet, has been received from the Southern Pacific officials. The booklets will be freely distributed at the Panama Pacific Exposition. They contain several pictures of Coos county industries and several paragraphs are devoted to the opportunities to be found in this section. Secretary Motley of the Chamber of Commerce is writing to John M. Scott, general passenger agent in Oregon for the Southern Pacific, asking if they will take 10,000 copies of the new Coos Bay booklet ready to be ordered. The first 5000 of a consignment ordered for here are now being printed in Portland.
