THE disaster in Italy due to the earthquake is tremendous in its scope and extent, both in loss of life and property, and in the inevitable destruction which must follow in the devastated towns and cities. There is little question but that the world will be called upon to help lift the unfortunate who are either destitute or badly injured, out of their misery, with generous donations of cash and supplies. The world in this instance means the United States, as we are at the present time the only country among the large nations in a position to send substantial aid to the disaster-stricken region.

The Times has at all times been among the first papers in the country in the work of gathering funds and supplies for the needy and for extraordinary occasions such as the present terrible disaster in Italy. We believe that at the present time we of this country should not be called upon for any large sum to aid the people in the earthquake zone. We have had tremendous demands both on our purse and our supplies by repeated appeals in behalf of the unfortunate Belgians, and we feel that at the present time we should not be called upon as long as Italy can find \$100,000,000 as a war fund for the preparation of meeting the European conflict.

If Italy can find that sum to engage in a war that she need not be drawn into unless she expressly desires it, she can certainly find enough money to take care of her disaster in the earthquake zone.

ROSEBURG SCENE OF I. W. W. RIOTS

I. W. W. Speakers Proclaim Trouble and Land in Jail.

ROSEBURG, Or., Jan. 20.—The accommodations of the city and county jail were taxed to their capacity the other night as a result of a riot in the business district following the arrest of an I. W. W. speaker on a charge of using profane language on the street.

Upon the arrival of Industrial Workers of the World here one of their number mounted a soapbox at a busy corner and started to expound the doctrine of the unemployed. In addition to attacking the flag and the flag supporters he called for men of conscience to assist him. The police were summoned and the speaker was removed from the box and arrested.

George Church, a prominent merchant and resident of the city, who is said to have intervened with the crowd, also was seized. Many Industrial Workers and several hundred citizens followed Mr. Church and speaker as they were taken to the city jail. For a half hour the air rang with yells and it was with difficulty that the police avoided further trouble. After exhausting all efforts to quiet the crowd of agitators, the police called the sheriff and his deputies and a dozen of the Industrial Workers were locked in the county jail.

Mr. Church said he was arrested without provocation. He engaged counsel and threatened to bring suit against the city for false arrest.

The spokesman for the Industrial Workers refused to divulge his name, but said he lived in Portland. A telegram was sent to Portland by an Industrial Worker following the trouble inviting the unemployed men to come to Roseburg and enforce their doctrine of free access opening. Resolutions have been filed to prevent an I. W. W. invader here.

GILLES' BROTHERS LUMBER TRADE

Lumber Shipments Via Panama Canals Exhibit Evidence of Progress.

BERKELEY, Wash., Jan. 20.—Lumber shipments from Great Britain during 1914 were 28,000,000 feet under those of 1913, while the cargo business showed an increase of 22,200,000 feet. The total net shipment of lumber or the year was 382,700,000 feet, while the water shipment amounted to 407,729,000 feet. The total net from the harbor was 412,829,000 feet, or about 20,000,000 feet below shipments made in 1913. These figures do not include the shipment of the five mills in the west end of the country or any of those east of the peninsula. The net of every mill on the harbor is estimated at 200,000,000 feet.

Nearly 3,000,000 feet of Great Britain lumber will be dispatched during this month to the east coast via the Panama Canal, involving all coasts for east coast shipments from this port for any single month. The total will be carried in two vessels—the Peter E. Crowell, which cleared here with 2,300,000 feet, and the Lewis K. Thurston, which is due here from New York.
