# LOCAL BREVITIES

**Auto Accident.**—It was C. F. McGeorge's car that collided with Mr. Rehfeld's bicycle the other day. It was erroneously stated that the Goodrum car had hit Mr. Rehfeld.

**New Eagles.**—Four new Eagles were initiated into the local order on Wednesday evening. They were William Fehl, Charles R. Watson, John Deiligan and I. Berg.

**Change Name.**—J. W. Bennett, Arthur Drews and J. S. Lyons, principal owners of the Nelson Iron Works, are taking steps to change the name to the Coos Bay Iron Works.

**Kirk Representative.**—F. R. Kirk, president of the Marshfield Aerie of Eagles, represents the order at the funeral of members. It was erroneously reported that D. J. Rees had represented the order at a recent funeral when it should have stated that Mr. Kirk did.

**Brings Potatoes.**—The Alert came down from Astoria last evening bringing 120 sacks of potatoes from the Carl Johnson farm for shipment on the Redondo for San Francisco. This afternoon the Alert took back a donkey engine belonging to Jack McDonald for use in hauling logs on Loon Lake.

**Martella Jury Disagrees.**—Word was received from John D. Goss in Portland yesterday afternoon to the effect that the jury had disagreed in the case of Martella versus the Coos Bay Pulp and Paper Company. This means that the case must now tail onto the tag end of the April docket and will mean a

great additional expense to both sides for retrial. According to the wire the jury was out between six and seven hours. The case now before the Portland court is that of Warthun versus the A. F. Estabrook company, charging it with trespass on land alleged to belong to Warthun.

**Strayed From the Path.**—John Hoke strayed from the straight and narrow path last evening; got a "snoot full" and found that all roads lead to the city bastille. He spent the night there and this morning felt his aching head, took a deep breath and "not footed" it away from that place of sighs and tears.

**Asks Opinion of Bill.**—Senator I. S. Smith has sent a copy of Senate Bill No. 16 to the executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce asking their opinion of it. According to the bill, which is introduced by Senator Langguth, the election of directors in corporations is to be restricted by law. Because it relates to corporations already in existence Senator Smith declares he is not in favor of the measure.

**Two Dogs Jailed.**—"You'll have to quit lettin' your dogs run 'round' 'quoth the police last evening when they picked up two stray dogs, loose about the city minus the license tags. They were locked up in a cell and will be "shot at sunrise" if the owners do not appear to claim them and pay the licenses. One is a good sized Collie, a good looking dog—the other an ordinary critter. Both are anxious to get out.

**Trailed by Checks.**—That Joe Nelson, alias several other names, who cashed a \$15 check here, may have left a trail of bad checks behind him on his way down the beach was believed today when F. W. Varelman, of the Gardiner store, came down and stated that a man answering Nelson's description cashed a bogus \$7 check at his store on Monday. Mr. Varelman will go to Coquille in the morning to identify the man.

**On Important Committee.**—John D. Goss has just received a letter from Judge A. S. Bennett, of The Dalles, and president of the State Bar Association, appointing him one of the five lawyers on the uniform legislation committee whose duty it will be to advise on matters of bar practice that comes up in the State Legislature. E. W. Hardy, of Portland, is chairman, and the other members are D. F. Stone, Klamath Falls, John Reynolds, Portland, and Arthur Langguth, Portland.

**German Papers.**—The Times is indebted to M. G. Pohl, of Bandon, for copies of some papers direct from Germany.

**Dispels Rumor.**—The rumor has been persistent here that Judge Coke is planning on calling a special jury session for the trial of the two Bandon perjury cases, that of Mrs. Ruby Simpson-Nosler and the other of Mrs. Pfortner, before the April term of

the circuit court. This Judge Coke denied this morning, saying that there is no reason for immediate action justifying the extra expense that the county would have to bear.

**No Money for Map.**—That the Oregon Commission will be unable to appropriate any money for a Coos Bay Relief Map is the word received here this morning from George M. Hyland of the Oregon Commission in Portland. With the budget already completed, the commission does not now find itself in a position to carry out the promise they made the Chamber of Commerce last year, that of paying half of the expense of a \$180 relief map that would be shown at the exposition. The letter also states that Hugh McLain has been there with them during the last few days and that he left yesterday for San Francisco where he expects to be for at least a week.

**Bankruptcy Hearing.**—Wednesday afternoon a hearing in the bankruptcy court involving Gust Demos and Tom Morris, former owners of the Grand Cafe in North Bend was heard before Referee C. A. Sehlbrede and Trustee Fred Gettins with W. A. Ackerman, attorney. George Conelos appeared as a witness, as purchaser of some Bunker Hill property from Gust Demos. The property was transferred within the four months before the petition for bankruptcy was filed. The object of the hearing was to get evidence to sustain the order of the referee to set aside the transferees a preference under the acts of bankruptcy so it may be sold for the benefit of the creditors. The case was continued until next week.
