In the "Poultry Raising" department of the current issue of Farm and Fireside a contributor tells as follows how to feed hens in order that their egg shells may be tougher of dye and can be used to suppleand stronger:

"Most of us know that plenty of oyster shell is necessary for our henneeded. The chemist has found that phosphorus and magnesia are both
